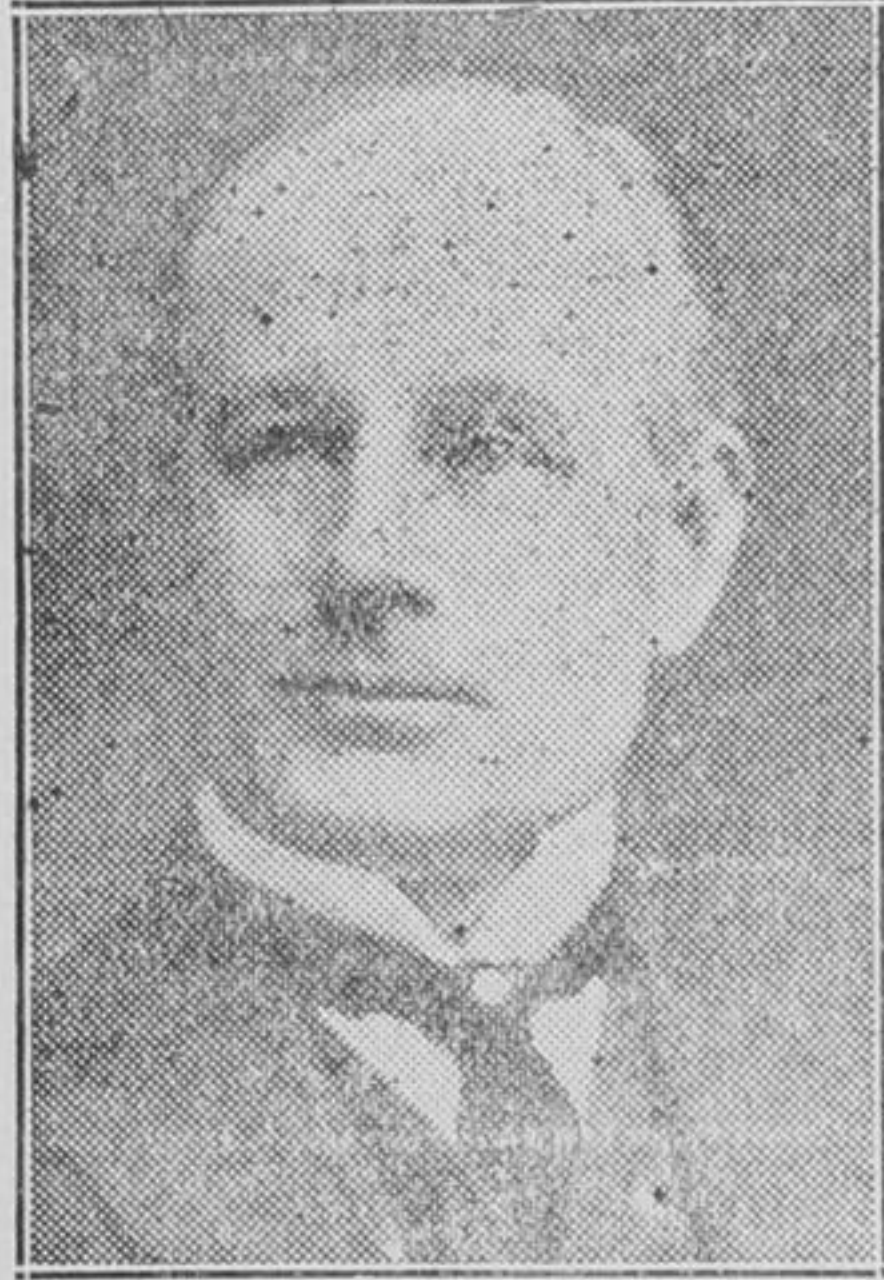

Stuffed Potatoes

Select smooth potatoes and have them as near the same size as possible. Bake them thoroughly. Cut off an end from each potato, scoop out the contents and season it with butter, salt and pepper. Add also two tablespoons of milk to each six potatoes beating well. Return the potato pulp to the shells, stand each on end and reheat in oven for five minutes.
