### Whitchurch Council

Whitchurch township council met at Vendorf Hall, Saturday, 12th instant with all members present.

Minutes of last meeting were read and approved.

Communications were presented and read as follows:—Dr. Williams M. O. H. giving report of circumstances found on visit at request of the Reeve to residence of Geo. Ellis an invalid at Vivian.

Soldier's Settlement Board, re payment of tax levies against east half lot 28, concession 3, and other properties under control of the Board.

Geo. Davies, giving account of expense incurred to repair damages by water to property at Musselman Lake in 1926, which he claimed to have been caused by diversion of water course at 9th concession line.

Deputy Provincial Secretary with list of Indigent Patients in Ontario hospitals, chargeable to this municipality.

Statements of expenditures for construction and the maintenance of township roads during 1926 were presented by road superintendent and clerk.

Geo. T. Noel presented a petition signed by himself and 16 other rate-payers requesting the Council to improve and open for traffic the side-line between lots 15 and 16 Con. 2.

Other resolutions passed:— Instructed the Treasurer to pay to Geo. E. Davies the sum of \$82.10 in full of claim for damage to building by water. Gave notice that at the next meeting of Council a by-law would be introduced dealing with the leasing of roadway at Willcox lake on which Mr. Ash has his boat house at present. Authorized the reeve and clerk to sign and submit to the Minister of

Highways the petition of the council showing that during 1926 there had been expended on the roads of the township \$16901.38 and requesting the satutory grant on that amount as provided by the Highway department. Relieved the collector from the collection of taxes assessed against some school teachers who have removed from the township amounting in all to \$48.19 and also dog taxes which he was unable to collect amounting to, \$24.00. Appointed Geo. Drury, road foreman for Division 10, Geo. Williams for Srigley Street and Landon Steckley for town line south. Council adjourned to April 9, next, then to meet at same place at 10 a.m.
