Aim To Improve North Yonge Street

A meeting was held in Richmond Hill, Ontario, on Thursday evening of last week by representatives of the districts along Yonge Street and it was decided to form an association for the improvement of Yonge Street and districts, and a meeting will be held in the Council room (Lorne Hall) Richmond Hill, on Thursday, April 14th, 1927, at eight p.m. for the purpose of organizing an association, which will have for its objects, the improvements of Yonge Street and District.

It was the unanimous opinion of those present that an era of prosperity and progress was in store for us and it was felt that we should co-operate and work together to obtain the needed improvements, to work out our problems and to unite in making Yonge Street and district one of the finest in Ontario. It was also felt that now was the opportune time for organization and that no time should be lost in seeking our requirements.

Some of the improvements discussed were:—High level bridge at York Mills; Sidewalks on Yonge Street from Mulock's to Toronto; Lighting of Yonge Street; Protection in the change of gauge of T. T. C.; Traffic regulations, such as prohibiting pedestrians from using the roadway where a sidewalk is provided. The entering and leaving of T. T. C. cars from side and not from roadway; the beautifying of Yonge Street and district. It was the unanimous opinion of those present that the need was urgent and that no time should be lost in seeking to remedy the defects. By next year, unless the York Mills bridge is built, Yonge Street will be the only highway entering Toronto that will not have high level approaches and it was felt that it was the duty of every citizen of York County to assist in the work of obtaining the York Mills Bridge and by so doing place Yonge Street on an equal footing with the other districts.

There is no part of Ontario that has the natural requirements for progress that we have and all that we require is to obtain the needed improvements and we will have Progress, Prosperity and Development, not equalled by any other district. It is hoped that every district will be well represented at the organization meeting on April 14th. Mayor J. M. Walton, of Aurora, was appointed Chairman and J. Harry Naughton, of Elgin Mills, Secretary of the meeting.
