one to Kleinburg stations.
T. MacMurphy-Egan—That the
Clerk be instructed to advertise for
Tenders for making the necessary
Cement Tile for the Township for the
year 1927. Tenders to be opened at
the next regular meeting at Schom-
berg, April 30th, 1927.

solved that By-law No. 432 be amend-
ed to read that fee for booths in
township be \$15.00 each season, pay-
able on or before the 1st day of May
each and every year, and the seal of

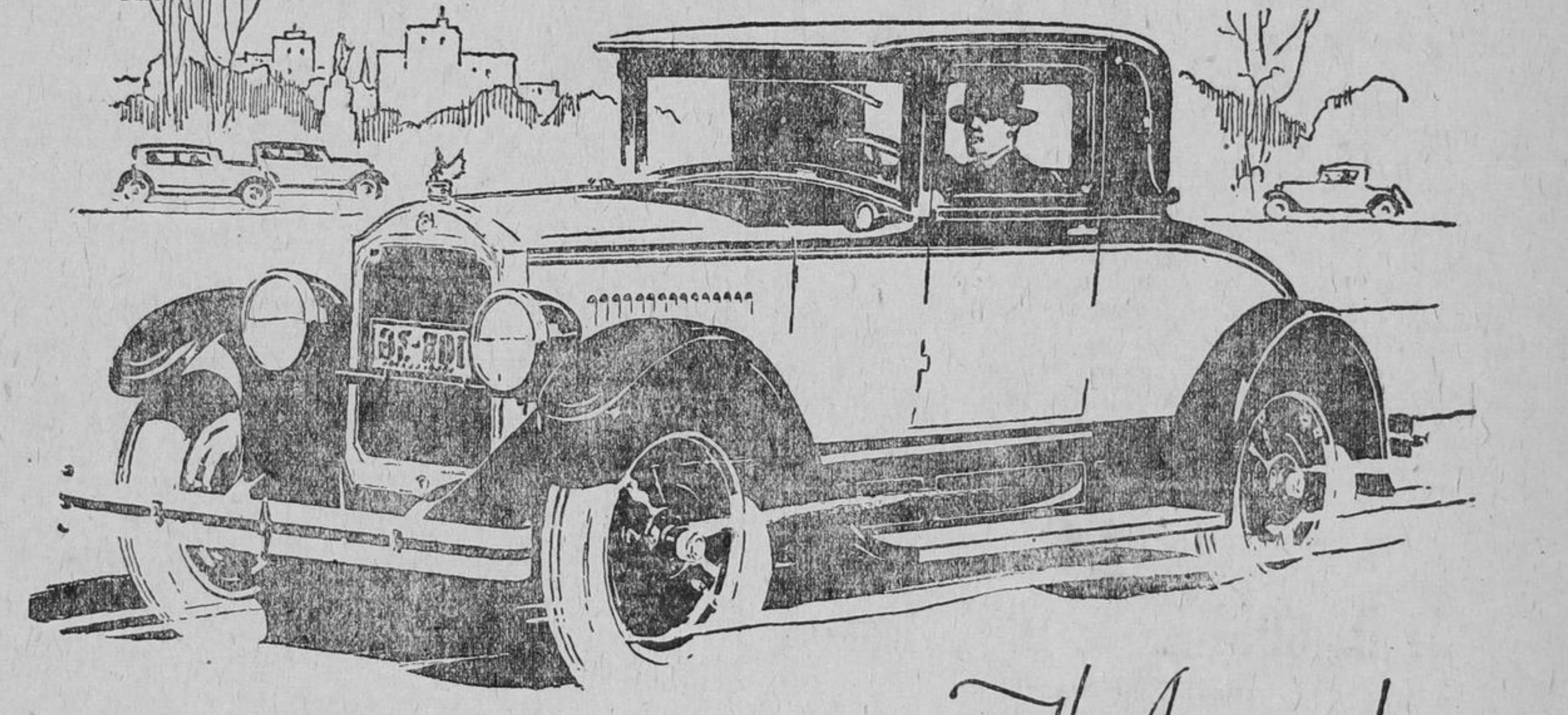
