The contests were under the direction of the county representative of the department of Agriculture Mr. R. J. Rogers who expressed himself as well pleased with the number of young people who took part and with the standard attained in all classes. The attendance was particularly gratifying in view of the fact that seeding operations are pretty general. The girl's classes were held in the High School and the boys judging was done in various places throughout the district. The following farmers very kindly provided stock for the judging, Mr. Milne, John McLean, Municipal Farm, E. T. Stephens, Col. Deacon, Unionville, L. E. Morgan, Milliken. In the evening a sumptuous banquet was held in the Presbyterian church when the winners in the various classes were announced and the prizes presented. The banquet which was given by the ladies of the church was served to the King's taste and was the subject of much favorable comment. One speaker remarked that the younger generation when studying household science need cast no reflections on the mothers who could supply such a bountiful and tasty repast as was spread before the gathering.

The prize for having the highest standing among the girls which entitles the winner to a three month short course at McDonald Institute, Guelph was awarded to Miss Hilda Martin of Wexford. Other winners in their classes who will be given a four day trip to Guelph are Miss Greta Ratcliffe, Stouffville, Della Steckley, Stouffville, Anna Lewis, Newmarket, Ruth Scott, Sutton, Jessie Watson, Agincourt; Clara Topham, Newmarket; Evelyn Weddell, Newmarket, Mable Snider, Vandorf. The three high girls of the contest will represent York County in the Provincial contest in the fall.

The young mens senior championship was won by Mr. Clarence Graham of Richmond Hill and he is the proud winner of the handsome George S. Henry, trophy. The junior championship was won by Mr. Stewart Chapman of Weston and the Imperial Bank trophy donated by the branches at Richmond Hill, Aurora and Newmarket also went to Weston. It goes to the coach of the best team and the winner this year was Mr. Les Clarkson and the members of his team were Stewart Chapman, Lorne Chapman and Clark Torrence.

The prizes to the winners of the junior contest were presented by Councillor James McLean who was also the donor of one of the cups. The prizes to the senior winners were presented by Mr. Whytock of Peel County. Short speeches were also made by Reeve Lunau of Richmond by Miss Elliott of Weston who coached the girls in the work Miss Chaplin and others. The meeting of the Women's Institute held last week at the home of Mrs. McIntosh was largely attended. The chief matter of business was the consideration of arrangements for a "Tag Day" to be held on, May 24. The society is seeking permission from the village council also the agricultural society to carry on the "Tag Day," for the benefit of the public library. Already quite a sum has been raised for this purpose and in a letter from the library board read at the meeting it was stated they are willing to cooperate with the Women's Institute in the matter of better books and higher library ideals.

NORTH YORK COUNCIL

The North York Township Council met at the Municipal Hall at Willowdale on Tuesday evening, April 19th.

A statement, composed of two letters were presented to council by the Armour Estates Limited and Township Engineer Baker to the effect that no provision had been made in the proposed North Toronto Sewage Disposal Plant, for sewage outside that area.

North York Township and Armour estates must now confront the problem of selecting a suitable site for the disposal plant in Armour Heights.

This much talked of Sewage system has been offered as a present to North York by Armour Heights Estates Limited. The donors assured council that if they would give permission and the Board of Health agreed with the plans they would construct a modern plant, without any expense to the Township.

The Council and Engineer Baker will inspect four sites which have been suggested on Thursday, April 21st.

A deputation of ratepayers from Sheppard Avenue appeared before the council headed by H. W. Berry, to complain of water flooding their lots. The Township engineer was instructed to investigate.

The Reeve informed F. Morris that if his petition for the extension of water mains on Drury Ave. was in for Thursday, April 21st the Council would consider it.

A by-law was passed to require the Board of Public School trustees to submit an estimate for the current year of the expenses of schools under their charge.

The Reeve and treasurer were authorized to borrow certain sums of money for the current year to meet the expenditures for schools.

The tender of the Bowden Lumber Co. was accepted, to supply 3000 feet of lumber for sidewalk at a cost of \$144.55.

Deputy Reeve Phillips and Hamby and councillor Bales were appointed to meet a committee of the North York Township post of the Canadian Legion to arrange a celebration on July 1st on the occasion of the Diamond Jubilee.

Sports will be featured at the annual fair of the Richmond Hill Agricultural Society on May 24. This was decided at a directors meeting held in Lorne Hall on Saturday night. There will be softball tournaments for both men and ladies teams for which valuable prizes will be given. It is understood that Mr. E. T. Stephens will donate a prize of \$50 for a first prize for the ladies tournament and that the society will put up a similar amount for a men's tournament. There will also be substantial second prizes. There will be one mile and two mile foot races as well as many other competitive events with prizes which should attract the best athletes in the district.

A communication was received from Hon. J. S. Martin, Minister of Agriculture advising that matters of personal business interfered with his proposed visit to Richmond Hill on May 24 to open the annual fair. It was decided that an invitation be extended to Hon. G. Howard Ferguson to officiate at the opening.

A letter was received from the Women's Institute asking permission to hold a tag day on the grounds in aid of the public library fund. The request was refused in view of the fact that a similar request had previously been refused another organization.

The grounds committee were instructed to go ahead immediately with preparations on the grounds to get them in shape for the ball tournaments. It is expected that four diamonds will be made and thus a large number of entries can be accommodated.

Thieves Again Break Into Dominion Store

For the fourth time in the course of a few months the Dominion store was burglarized on Monday night and a quantity of goods stolen. The thieves entered by way of the cellar cutting a panel of the door to gain access to the main store. This place was ransacked apparently in search of money but as none was found only goods, mostly tobacco and cigarettes were taken. Last summer Hall's service station was visited in the night eight times and goods and money stolen, but in none of the above cases have the offenders been brought to justice. The prevalence of this thieving emphasizes the necessity of better protection in the village. Merchants and business people who invest large sums of money in stock and goods are entitled to better protection than has been afforded in the past and the preservation of the property of honest citizens demands that action be taken to provide the protection which the local situation demands.
