General News and Views

The adoption of daylight saving was the most important item put through at the council meeting in Newmarket last week. This will become effective June 12 and continue until September 11th.

Motorists who own closed cars should warn their passengers not to lean against the doors. On a number of occasions people have fallen out of automobiles with more or less serious results because they leaned too heavily against the doors. One young lady was hurt very badly when her friend took a sudden turn. The door against which she was leaning flew open and she was thrown into the road. The motorist should remember that he is responsible for the safety of his passengers.

Ontario's new speed limit of 35 miles an hour for motor cars automatically came into effect on April 5th, but it doesn't apply to incorporated towns and village where the speed limit is set by local by-law.

When school fairs were started in Peel County only eggs were sent out from which chickens were to be raised for competition. Last year sending baby chicks were tried out, and proved so successful that this year 978 baby chicks have been asked.

The Provincial Board of Health has condemned 34 wells in Alliston, some of them being infested with typhoid germs.

Deputy-reeve J. R. Campbell of Markham Township was in Toronto last week attending the meeting of the Ontario Milk Producers Association, when the summer price for milk was agreed to with the milk distributors. The drop in price is the same as last year, and will be effective May 1st.

Prices for milk delivered in Toronto are to be:—May \$1.95; June \$1.90; July \$1.90; Aug. \$1.95; the balance of the year (8 months) at \$2.20 per can.

British Columbia claims the world's highest average age of marriage. Unofficial figures show the ages of the bridegrooms to average 32 and the brides 27. The same statistician figures that British Columbia has the world's lowest birth rate, with the exception of Sweden. Canada averages 26 children in every ten families but British Columbia averages 19 to every ten. Preponderance of males in unsettled sections and the influx of unmarried persons for the coastal industries are blamed for the odd figures.

Dry sweeping of sidewalks is not permitted in some municipalities as a health measure. In the city of Oshawa all the merchants have been served with a notice that this practice must be discontinued. The by-law provides for a penalty of \$50.

The Orillia Humane Society has undertaken to destroy all ownerless dogs in that town, provided the town officials will capture them. All untagged dogs in Orillia are liable to be caught and disposed of in order to protect the flower beds lawns and gardens.

Collingwood's Board of Trade is asking for a liquor store in that town and Warton citizens are organizing to protest against one in that village.

Can any person explain where all the stray dogs come from when the spring work is started in gardens?

Keen Interest In Seed Cleaning

Tour of Ontario by the "Better Seed Train" Productive of Good Results

"Ontario farmers are taking a wonderful interest in the vital question of better seed" stated J. Lockie Wilson in reviewing the run of the "Better Seed Train" which recently completed a tour of Western Ontario. "We had an average attendance of almost 300 at each of the 47 stops, or about 14,000 in all. This is much better than a year ago when the train made a longer run."

Almost 3,000 bushels of grain and small seeds were cleaned and graded by the modern machines on board the train. This stuff was brought in by farmers visiting the special. "They were very much interested in the modern seed-cleaning machinery," stated Mr. Wilson, "and realized that the old fashioned fanning mills were inadequate to do the job properly." Every bag cleaned was graded and tagged before being returned to the farmer bringing in the seed.

As a result of the run through Eastern Ontario a year ago at least twenty modern seed-cleaning plants have been installed in that part of the province and Mr. Wilson believes that even better results will follow the Western Ontario run. Already inquiries are coming in about modern cleaning machines, and Oxford County has purchased a machine which was used on the train. Mr. Wilson stated that Agricultural Representative Green of the County believed that three or four more machines would be installed in that county in the near future.

The exhibit of plowshares suitable for turning under alfalfa sod was well received, and James McLean, Richmond Hill, who was in charge, had to face a daily barrage of questions. The train was under the supervision of A. R. G. Smith of New Hamburg.

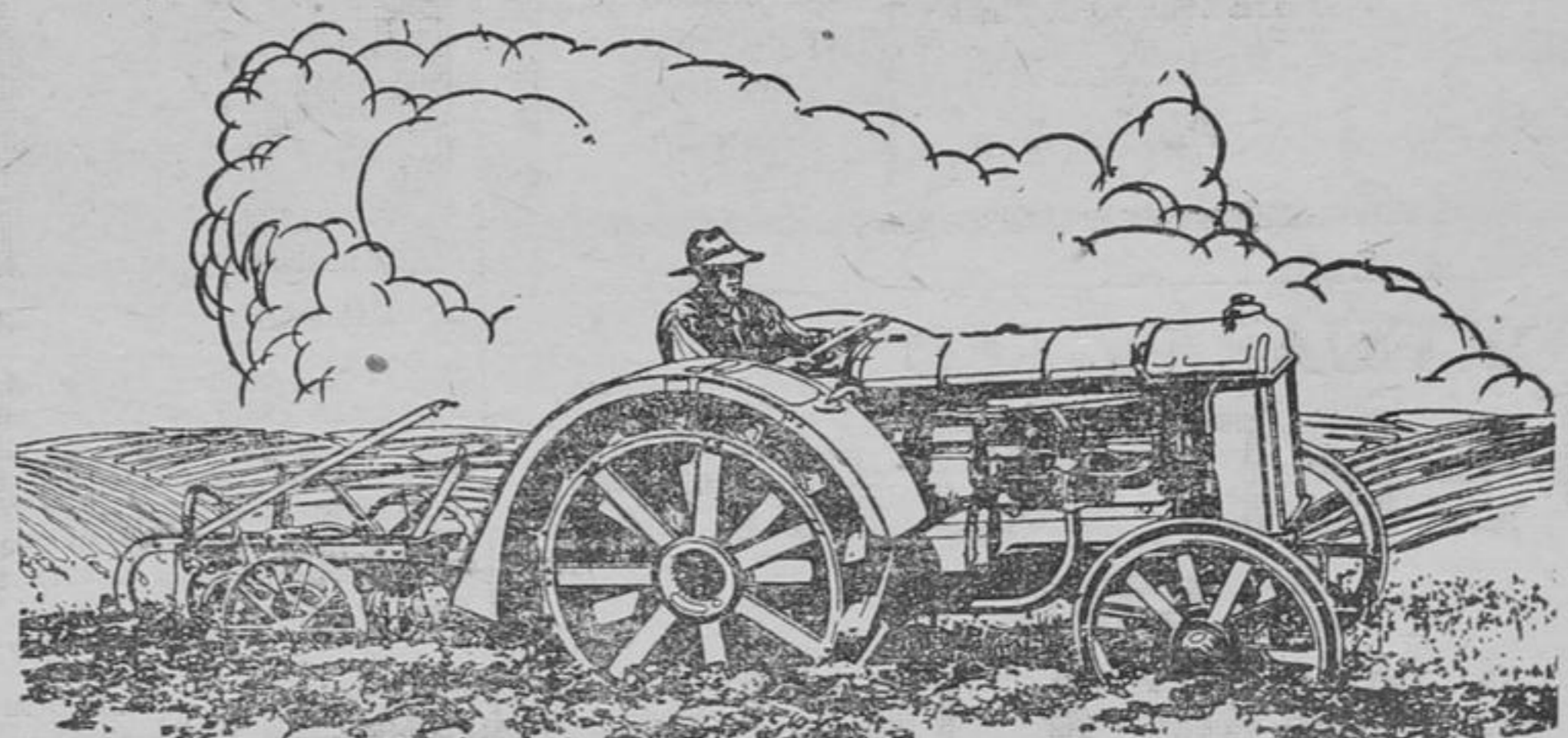
