United Church Held Annual Meeting

A spirit of gratification and optimism marked the annual congregational meeting of the Richmond Hill United Church which was held on Thursday April 28th. The attendance was large and reports were presented from all the organizations. The report of the Treasurer showed all accounts paid to date and a substantial balance still in the treasury. The sum of \$1800 was raised for the maintenance and extension fund of the United Church, the Auxiliary of the W. M. S. exceeded the allocation of \$400 by \$52, besides sending away a bale of clothing valued at \$65 and the Y. W. Auxiliary raised \$123, their allocation being \$100. During the year the senior Y. P. S. contributed \$50.00 for the support of a boy at the Georgetown Armenian Home, and gave \$100 to the M. and E. fund, and still have about \$100 on hand. About forty new members were added during the year, bringing the total membership up to 587 and including 140 members at Victoria Square makes a grand total of 727. Widening Of The Roadway Commonly Known As The "Little Concession"

NOTICE is hereby given that the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Vaughan proposes, after the 26th day of May 1927, being the date of the last publication of this notice, to pass a by-law.

1. 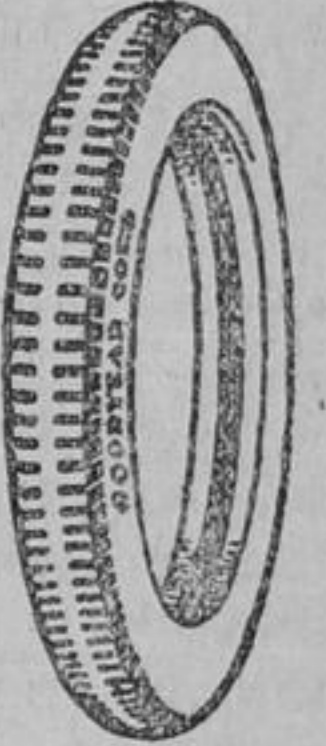

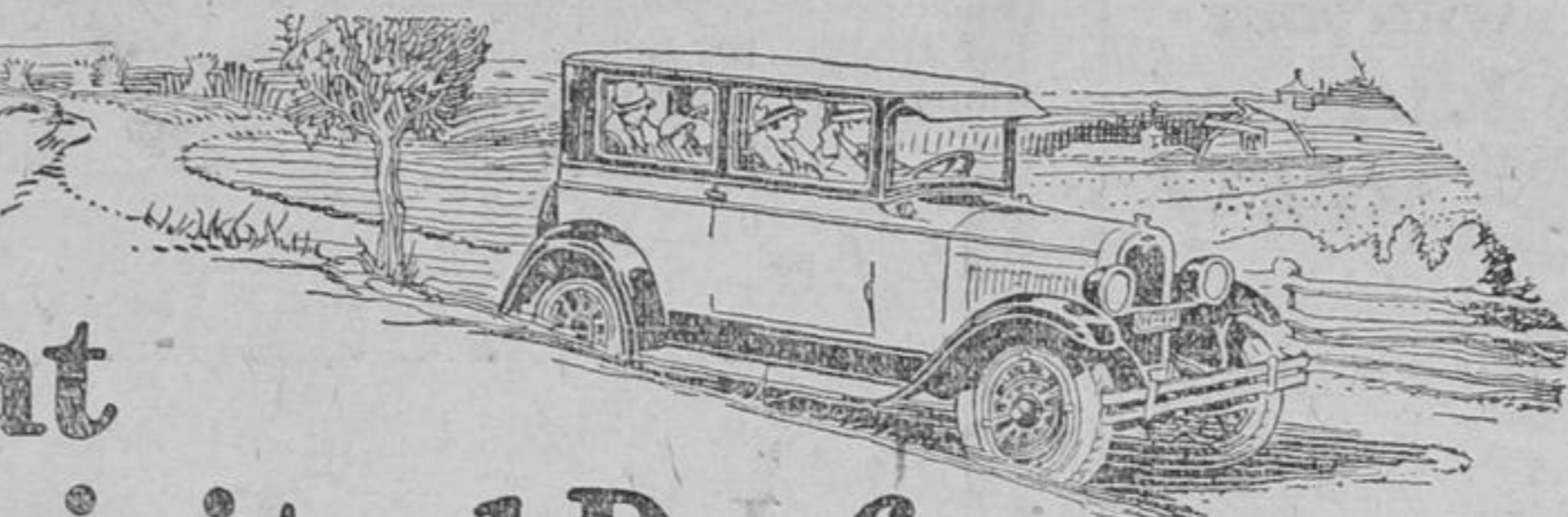
