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**King Township Council**

The regular meeting of King Township Council met at Smith's Hotel, Schomberg on Saturday April 30th, with all the members present and the reeve in the chair.  
The minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed, a number of communications were presented and read.  
The council in committee of the whole on bills, Mr. Duggan in the chair and a number of account were presented and ordered paid by the Treasurer.

**Resolutions**  
F. A. Egan moved, seconded by E. Armstrong—that Mrs. J.T. Howard be paid the sum of \$45.00 for attending Mrs. Hutchins, 30 days at \$1.50 per day, as per order of deputy reeve Joseph Duggan.

T. MacMurchy, moved, seconded by E. Armstrong—that the Assessors, Messrs Webb and Armstrong be paid the sum of \$100.00 each on account.

T. MacMurchy moved, seconded by J. Duggan That the Tender of Geo. M. Williams for making cement tile as per advertised specifications for the sum of \$371.25 be accepted.

F. A. Egan moved, seconded by T. MacMurchy—that this council authorize the treasurer to pay to the treasurer of East Gwillimbury the sum of \$26,663.80, being balance of King Township's share of debenture re Holland Marsh Drainage Scheme.

T. MacMurchy moved, seconded by J. Duggan—that Arthur Stogdill be paid the sum of \$10.00 for damage to property and opening culvert.

T. MacMurchy moved, seconded by E. Armstrong—that Naughton and Jenkins be paid the sum of \$232.96 in payment of account re Holland Marsh Drainage scheme as per enclosed statement.

J. Duggan mover, seconded by F. A. Egan—that the treasurer be authorized to pay to Roy Monkman the sum of \$19.60, payment for care of E. Hutchin's stock by order of Joseph Duggan.

F. A. Egan moved, seconded by T. MacMurchy that the Treasurer pay to Milton Payne the sum of \$100.00 price of 4 sheep killed by dogs as per sworn statement of sheep valuator.

F. A. Egan moved, seconded by J. Duggan—that the Treasurer be authorized to pay to the Aurora Banner Press the sum of \$53.50 for debentures with coupons re Holland Marsh Drainage Scheme.

F. A. Egan moved seconded by J. Duggan—that this council hereby confirm the action of the Reeve in authorizing the Treasurer to issue a cheque for the sum of \$30.00 to J. D. Thompson being funeral expenses re late Wm. Webb.

J. Duggan moved, seconded by E. Armstrong—that this council buy two graders from the Canada Ingot Iron Co. of Guelph to be shipped to Bolton.

T. MacMurchy moved seconded by J. Duggan—that the treasurer be authorized to accept from Elton Armstrong the sum of \$10.00 for trees sold to Cecil Wray and credit same to the Township.

F. A. Egan moved, seconded by T. MacMurchy—that the Treasurer be authorized to pay to D. J. MacDonald County Treasurer the sum of \$174.75, being the Township's share of Municipal Relief Account.

On Motion, Council adjourned to meet at Temperanceville Hall, Kettleby as a Court of Revision and other business as may come before the council. Court opens at 2.30 o'clock p.m. on Saturday, May 28th, 1927.
