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GENERAL NEWS AND VIEWS

The Toronto—Orillia bus was held up for some time on Sunday evening in Richmond Hill with a broken spring. The motor bus driver and the passengers who were inconvenienced had everything but compliments for the Richmond Hill street.

Hydro officials in Ontario are said to be envious of the high salaries to be paid the members of the new liquor commission. Managing an industry based on booze may be a more difficult undertaking than one propelled by water power.

Dredging in the marsh drainage work at Bradford has been completed and all that remains to be done is the touching up of the canal in spots and the completion of the dam.

Sir Wm. Mulock will give the opening address at Newmarket on Friday, July 1st in connection with the Jubilee Celebration.

We wonder if it is because of the outlook of the pocket book that so many cars are painted blue this year.

All events in connection with the Brooklin Spring Fair, which for many years has been held on Victoria Day had to be called off on account of rain. The directors have decided to carry out the full program on Saturday afternoon, June 11th, providing the weather is favorable.

Mr. Thos. Lewis one of the councillors of the Township of Uxbridge had the misfortune to lose one of his horses recently. The animal died of spinal meningitis and at the present time another horse is suffering from the same ailment. A veterinary was called as soon as the animal showed signs of illness, but nothing could be done to save the beast.

As an aid to the farmers in the Township of Pickering in the apprehension of chicken thieves, the municipal council offered a reward of \$100 to the person or persons who through their vigilance gave information causing the arrest of the guilty ones on this charge. Since then two men were sentenced for the offence, and a dispute arose over who was entitled to the reward, and so far it has not been paid.

The annual Sunday school Convention of the Township of East Gwillimbury is to be held in the United Church at Mount Albert on Tuesday the 14th of June commencing at 10 a.m. It is hoped that every Sunday school in the Township will be represented and the citizens of the village are making arrangements for their entertainment. Everybody in the surrounding community should attend the evening session.

Officials in Japan have taken stern measures to prevent the young ladies from becoming flappers. One hundred who work in offices were told to quit imitating westerners, ordered to put on their kimono costumes and keep off the streets. Japan police have the affair in hand and appear to be dealing fairly firmly with the fluttering flappers in their frivolous frolics.

The Dominion Government has arranged for the breaking of fifty-one quarter sections of land north of Edmonton, the biggest single breakage contract in the history of the province.

The next step will be to oil the windshield so that one may go through it more easily in case of an accident.

The death of Mrs. George Weatherill occurred on Thursday evening May 26th, after an illness of only five days. She had been in her usual health until the previous Saturday when she suffered a paralytic stroke never regaining consciousness. Mrs. Weatherill was a daughter of the late Robert Harrington. She was a member of the Unionville United Church, and took an active interest in church work. She was in her 66th year and leaves to mourn her loss her husband two sons, Robert H. of Ringwood, Herbert N. and two daughters, Mrs. Telfer W. Wegg and Mrs. Wm. E. Smith of Unionville. The funeral which was held on Saturday was largely attended. The floral offerings were many and beautiful. The re-

mains were laid to rest in Elmwood cemetery, Markham.

Regulate Lights

Speaking before the ninth annual meeting of the Ontario Truck Owners' Association in Toronto, Hon. George S. Henry provincial minister of highways warned that unless some definite progress is made this year in the focusing of headlights so as to avoid the menace of glare, and more proper observance generally of headlight regulations is made by motor vehicle operators, restrictive measures may be taken by the department such as the reducing of the candlepower of bulbs, which would ultimately result in the slowing down of traffic.

"There are too many breaches of the headlight laws of the Province," Mr. Henry declared, intimating that all classes of motor vehicle operators alike were remiss in this way. He was satisfied, he said that a great many accidents to pedestrians and motorists on the highway at night were due to excessive glare of headlights and the new regulations, if necessary, would be brought in to make the highways safer.

The Correct Procedure.

Must Have License

An order-in-council has been passed by the Ontario government providing that all automobile drivers in Ontario must be licensed after July 1st next. Each individual license will cost \$1.00 and will be good until the end of 1928.

Competent examiners will be appointed in many centres throughout the province to put the new regulations into effect. Experienced drivers, that is motorists who have driven for six months and at least 500 miles will not have to submit to examination. Inexperienced drivers will be put through a rigid test and in addition to the \$1.00 license fee, will be required to pay the examiner \$1.00 as his fee.

A possible revenue of between \$600,000 and \$800,000 should accrue to the provincial treasury through the impost.
