T. T. C. Have Permission To Widen Gauge

Work Will Be Commenced in The Near Future

At a meeting of the Ontario Rail-| way Board held on Wednesday the T. T. C. were granted permission to change the gauge of the Metropolitan radials to conform with the tracks in the city of Toronto, and although it is expected that work will be commenced in the very near future T. T. C. officials interviewed by the Liberal were unable to say just when work would commence. The change of gauge will be welcomed by the entire North Yonge St. district who are looking for a much improved service with a possiblity of lower fares sometime in the future when the system gets well established under T.T.C. management. ## 1927 Crops Promise An Abundant Yield

Although a good many farmers in York County have finished having there is still a considerable quantity in the fields and the recent heavy rains made the saving of the crops a real problem. Frequent and heavy showers have also delayed harvesting of the wheat crop, and have caused some lodging in the grain crops. Prospects however, remain exceptionaly good, subject to more favorable weather being forthcoming. Indications are that the corn-borer is getting good work although corn fields are not as plentiful as in former years. Many farmers have turned to sweet clover as a subsitute, and when cutting for hay it has been found advantageous to cut with a binder and to stook up until cured. It is handled much better this way, and can be car ed for in bad weather more easily than by curing loose. Barley seems to be a good crop; cutting has commenced in eastern counties, and will be general this week. Apples are looking fair, but a heavy crop is not anticipated. Pastures remain wonderfully good for this time of year, and a splendid afterpromise of being a good crop, as also do mangles and turnips. There seems to be a good showing of raspberries all over, but cherries are light. All live stock are doing well, but milk flow is naturally decreasing. As for the seed crops, alsike promises very good, but alfalfa production is likely to show a considerable reduction, partly owing to rank growth and lodging.
