Tenders Called For Richmond Hill Street

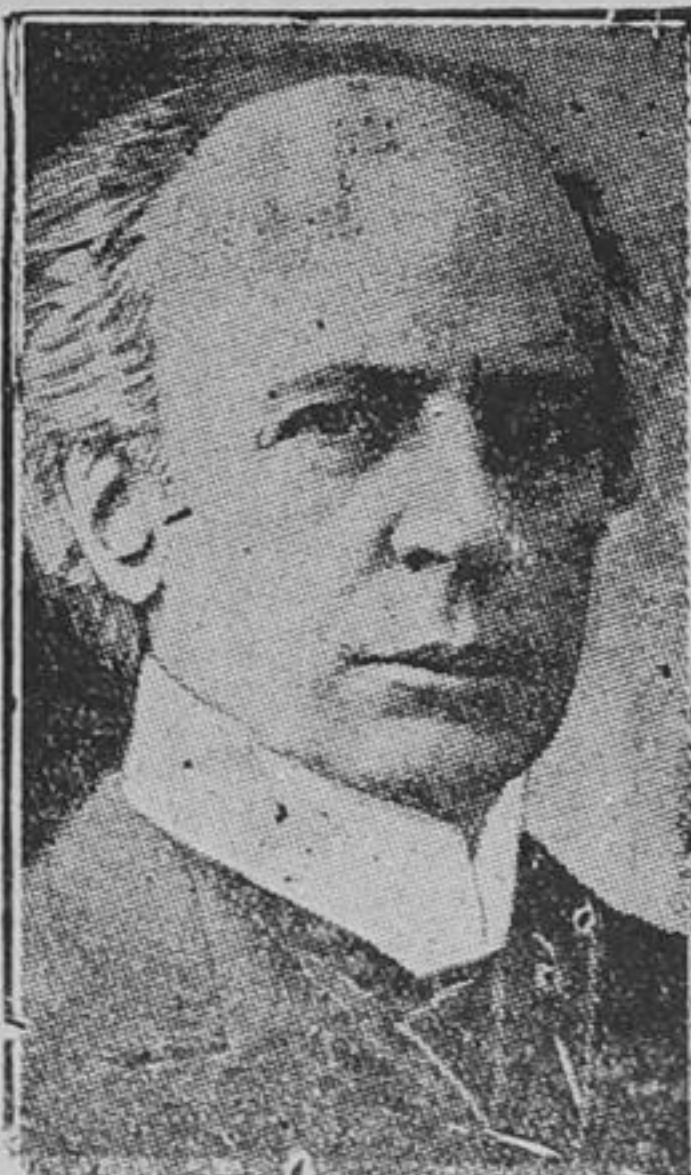

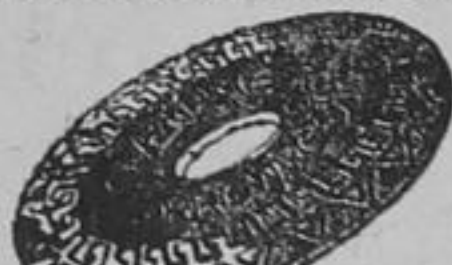
