Hydro Commission Met

The North York Hydro Commission held their regular session in the Municipal Hall at Willowdale on Tuesday evening, August 2nd.

Owing to the increase in office duties due to the newly enlarged area, and the need for larger office space, it was decided at the meeting to put the Hydro Dept. in the Engineers office, move the Engineers to the Police Dept. and the police to the present Hydro office. Although the present office space is not sufficient, it is not at all likely that an addition to the present building will be made for several vears.

Council also discussed the question of the water works dept. and Hydro and as to whether they should pay a share of the cashiers salary. It was pointed out, that he is put to a considerable amount of work looking after these accounts. The present Hydro consumers number about 1.600.

The Hydro chairman and secretary were authorized to sign the lease with the C. N. R. for the use of a small plot of land, 50 x 100 feet at Downsview as a pole yard.
