

A Serious Situation

* the town water without boiling In the interest of Public Health this advice should be strictly heeded out by the people who must realize the seriousness of such a condition and appreciate the great danger of using water which is contaminated.

In view of the report from the provincial authorities in 19-24 when a test of the wells of the village was made and 84 per cent. of those tested found to be grossly polluted, the present situation appears to be a very serious one. If 84 per cent. of the wells tested in 1924 were grossly polluted it is reasonable to suppose that many wells are at present in a similar or worse condition. It is probable that many are a good deal worse because some have not been used very much in past years.

If 84 per cent. of the wells of the village are grossly polluted and the town water is unsafe to use for domestic purposes the water problem is a very serious one for the village. As a safeguard to public health it would appear commendable for the Board of Health to immediately have a survey made of the town wells and make sure that they are fit for the use of the people.


Heroic Action Saved Three From Drowning
