Local Improvement Notice

TAKE NOTICE THAT:—

1. The Council of the Corporation of the Township of Vaughan intends to construct as a local improvement a Macadam Pavement, ten feet wide, on the streets set out in schedule below, and intends to specially assess a part of the cost upon the land abutting directly on the work:

2. The estimated cost of the work is \$11,360.00 of which \$350.00 is to be paid by the Corporation. The estimated cost per foot frontage is 50 cents. The special assessment is to be paid in ten annual instalments.

3. A petition to the said council will not avail to prevent its construction, but a petition against the work or the manner in which it has been undertaken may be made pursuant to Section 8 of The Local Improvement Act, to the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board, by a majority of the owners representing at least one-half of the value of the lots which are to be specially assessed therefor.

4. A by-law for undertaking the work will be considered by the Council at a meeting thereof to be held on Tuesday the 6th day of September 1927, or at a regular or special meeting thereof to be held thereafter.
