

MARKHAM TOWNSHIP PUBLIC NOTICE RE NOXIOUS WEEDS

Section 4 of the Weed Control Act, Richmond Hill — Ont 1927, provides as follows: "Every occupant of land, or if the land is unoccupied, the owner, shall destroy all Bladder Campion, Ox-eye Daisy, Perennial Sow Thistle, White Cocle, Wild Mustard, Wild Oats, Canada Thistle, Burdocks, etc., as often in

Section 9 of the same Act also provides-"Any owner or occupant of land who contravenes any of the provisions of this Act or who refuses or neglects to obey any lawful order of the Inspector given under this Act shall incur a penalty of not less than \$20 nor more than \$50 for every such offence. R. S. O. 1914, C. 253, S. 10, Amended."
