GENERAL NEWS AND VIEWS

William Meek, charged with setting fire to the barn belonging to J. Norman Somerville, of Vaughan, pleaded guilty and upon examination was found to be mentally unfit. Meek had only recently arrived from the Old Land and will likely be deported. Immediately after the Exhibition closes work will be commenced on widening the gauge of the Yonge St. Radial line from the city limits to Sutton.

New rural mail boxes will shortly replace the swinging arm type now in vogue. The increase of traffic on the highways and byways brought to the attention of the postal officials the risk of damage to and by the boxes sticking out over the road. To eliminate this objectionable feature the new boxes are pivoted on the post so that at no time can they extend more than half their own length outside the post.

Parry Sound man, cook at a fishing station, instead of providing a radio for amusement during the winter has tamed a crow and its teaching it to talk. He has also a young crane.

The sudden passing of Dr. F. C. Stevenson of Bradford, recently has caused a severe loss to a host of friends in and about Bradford where he had practised for forty years.

The Canadian hay crop set a new record this year, if the preliminary figures just released by the Dominion bureau of statistics survive later correction. It is estimated at 16,648,000 tons, just 300,000 tons above the former record, 16,348,000, made in 1919. Wet weather has generally reduced its value, of course.

The other striking feature of the report has already been sufficiently commented upon in the press. It is the forecast of a total wheat crop of over 357,000,000 bushels, which is 40,000,000 above the estimate made at the same time last year—and last year's estimate fell 90,000,000 bushels short of the actual threshing returns.

During the month of August we had 268 hours of sunshine, in all 16 hours above normal—and only one really cloudy day. The mean temperature has been 64.8, or 1.5 below average. Highest was 85, on the 7th of the month, and lowest 48, on the 24th. The rainfall was 1.47 inches, or 1.71 below average.

Fire from an unknown cause destroyed the barns and stables with all this season's crop, of Graham Bros., "Cairnbrogie," a half mile west of Claremont, on Tuesday of last week. Only the assistance of the neighbors and the intelligent work of the Claremont fire brigade with their chemical engine saved the fine colonial brick house, and the implement shed.

"The mile and a quarter of county highway on the 8th con., north of Mt. Joy, which was recently built is already breaking up in places. This piece of road is very wavy and should not be taken over by the engineer is the general opinion of those who have occasion to use it."—Markham Sun.

Fire destroyed the house and contents of Percy Gelder, on 40th avenue east, N.Y. Tp. Thur. afternoon, last Mr. Gelder had been working in his iron shop a short distance away and on going to his house and opening the door found the interior in flames. So fiercely was the fire burning that by the time the North York township fire brigade arrived a few minutes later nothing could be done to save the place. The nearest hydrant was over 1,600 feet away. None of the contents of the house were saved. A writing desk just inside the door, which contained valuable documents, could not be approached. The total damage is estimated at \$5,000, parti-

ally covered by insurance. The cause of the fire is a mystery.
