11,300 imperial gallons of water and 20 tons of coal. In working order the total weight of engine and tender is 638,000 pounds. Note the new position of the whistle, located on the left hand of the smoke box near the stack. This



MARKHAM TOWNSHIP PUBLIC NOTICE RE NOXIOUS WEEDS

Section 4 of the Weed Control Act, 1927, provides as follows: "Every occupant of land, or if the land is unoccupied, the owner, shall destroy all Bladder Campion, Ox-eye Daisy, Perennial Sow Thistle, White Cocle, Wild Mustard, Wild Oats, Canada Thistle, Burdocks, etc., as often in year as is sufficient to prevent the ripening of their seeds.

Section 9 of the same Act also provides-"Any owner or occupant of land who contravenes any of the provisions of this Act or who refuses or neglects to obey any lawful order of the Inspector given under this Act shall incur a penalty of not less than \$20 nor more than \$50 for every such offence. R. S. O. 1914, C. 253, S. 10, Amended."


