the assessment when the council met as a court of revision on Monday night. Two of the appeals were disallowed and slight reductions were made in two cases. The appeals were by H.A. Nichols, Dr. Hamilton, H.W. Cook and the Thos. Clark Estate. Mr. Nichols pointed out that he thought the assessment on his Yonge Street property which was formerly occupied by the Shoe Company was too high in comparison with other properties. He claimed that the assessment of the town was not equitable and that he had suggested a year ago that a commission be appointed to have it revised and equalized. The council were of the opinion that the assessment was fair and in as much as a reduction of \$200 was made last year refused to take any action this year.

Mr. Cook drew attention to several cases which he pointed out were examples of inequality of assessment and asked for a substantial reduction. A reduction of twenty-five dollars was allowed by the council. The assessment of the property of Dr. Hamilton was lowered \$200 and the assessment of the Thos. Clark estate was sustained.


