GENERAL NEWS AND VIEWS

The experience which traffic cops in Richmond Hill are gaining these days should qualify them for a job in New York next year.

The sale of George McKuen of Lemonville, held last week brought a total of over \$5000. There was a large crowd in attendance and two auctioneers were in charge all the time.

Deputy-Reeve J. R. Campbell of Markham Township has been elected president of the Milk Producers Association.

A Quebec woman, aged 103, has had her hair bobbed and enjoyed her first ride on a train. In the future she purposes leading her own life.

The old time practice of kissing the bride received a jolt at a recent wedding, when an awkward-looking guest was asked if he had kissed the bride, and replied "Not lately."

The young people's societies are getting organized again for the winter season.

All things being equal, men stick to those who stick to them.

Increased assistance in the matter of secondary education—more roads—agricultural research—extension of Hydro service throughout rural Ontario—these are the "big four" aids to agriculture planned by the Ontario Government, as recently announced by Premier Ferguson.

The Town of Uxbridge is asking for special parliamentary legislation to reduce the size of their municipal council from eight members to five. As the councillors receive pay at the rate of \$2 per meeting, and five men may do as much as eight, there is good reason for making the change.

Last year over 2,400 miles of radial tracks were torn up in Canada and buses substituted. Such is the trend of travel.

An exceptionally fine crop of Irish Cobbler potatoes has been harvested on the marsh land at Holland Landing. The murphies are choice mealy ones and the yield was very gratifying.

Stouffville business houses will close every evening except Saturday during the winter months. The Tribune expressed the opinion last week that the move was not conducive to increased business for the village in as much as Uxbridge and Markham were extending their business hours. Three places of business did not enter into the agreement and will remain open on Tuesday and Thursday nights.

Goodwood farmers are getting ten and twelve cents per bushel for turnips this year.

The scarcity of beech nuts and walnuts this year in some districts is said to be a sign of an open winter.

Newmarket citizens are delighted to hear that a part of the plant belonging to the Estate of the William Cane & Sons Co., Ltd., is shortly to be reopened.

Motor license fees are to come down and the gasoline tax is to go up in the beginning of the year. Ups and downs are just what life is made up of.

If the prairie fire near Medicine Hat wiped out a herd of antelope, as is reported, it gives one some idea of the speed such a fire can travel for there is nothing slow about the antelope.

Stouffville has a peeping Tom whom many residents would like to catch and give the proper punishment for this sneaking offense.

Robt. Meed of the 7th concession of Markham, who suffered a fractured leg when he was thrown from a load of gravel coming out of a rough pit, some ten weeks ago, is now able to be out of bed, the plaster having been removed from the limb. It is expected that he will shortly be completely recovered. When Mr. Meed fell from the wagon, the one wheel passed over the calf of the leg crushing the bone under the weight of the heavily loaded wagon.



QUEEN'S BROTHER PASSES
The Marquis of Cambridge, brother of Queen Mary, has passed away following a serious operation. He held many official positions during his life, and saw considerable military service both in the Boer War and the Great War.

Stouffville council have passed a by-law designating all side streets "Stop streets," where motor cars and other vehicles must come to a stop before coming on the Main Street. Signs will be put up at these intersections. Most other towns and many townships are doing the same in the hope of controlling the appalling number of motor accidents.

An old landmark of Newmarket will soon have passed from the horizon. Another two weeks of wrecking work will obliterate the old Eagle Hotel on Huron street. The hotel is believed to be about 100 years old, according to Mr. Walter Graves of East Gwillimbury who has purchased the building without the land from the Davis Leather Co.

One of the oldest persons to pass away in Ontario died in the House of Refuge in Whitby in the person of Mrs. William Baker, she being 104 years of age. The poor old lady had outlived all her relatives, and was taken back to the Stone Church Cemetery in Thorah for burial. Half a century ago she was a resident of Beaverton.

In an attempt to reduce the number of accidents at level crossings, the Board of Railway Commissions has issued an order requiring danger signs to be lowered within 5 feet or 5 feet six inches of the ground. The purpose of the order is to bring the signs low enough to be illuminated by the headlights of motor cars.

Whitchurch Veterans Held Meeting

On Thursday, October 27th, the Whitchurch Veteran Association met at Vandorf with President J. C. Marriott in the chair. It was arranged that the Veterans join in the church parade with the Stouffville Association at 10 a.m. on November 6th. Secretary Fred Steckley was instructed to purchase poppy wreaths for decoration of the Soldiers Memorials. The President reported the relief of one distress case in the Municipality. Speeches were made by Arthur Van Nostrand, F.E. Hollidge, W.W. Jacobs, past president Percy Cutler and others.
