Canned Pumpkin For Pies

Cut up into convenient sections. Core and remove skins. Cook for 30 minutes to reduce the pulp. Pack in clean glass jars; add three quarters of a cupful of brown sugar and 1 teaspoon salt to each quart of pulp. Place rubber and top in position! Partially seal the jars. Add warm water to come one inch over top of jars, and boil jars for sixty minutes, commences to bubble. This recipe also may be used for squash.

Pumpkin Marmalade

Three quarts raw pumpkin, cut in small dice, 3 quarts granulated sugar, 3 large lemons.
