

# TOWNSHIP OF VAUGHAN Court of Revision

- The Council of the Corporation of the Township of Vaughan has constructed as a Local Improvement Macadam Pavements on the Streets as shown in the Schedule below.
- The cost of the work is \$16,840.38 of which \$535.10 is to be paid by the Corporation. The special rate per foot frontage is 65.9 cents, and the special annual rate is 8.53 cents per foot. The special assessment is to be paid in ten installments.
- The estimated lifetime of the work is ten years.
- A Court of Revision will be held on the 15th day of December 1927, at 10.00 a.m. o'clock at the Township Hall, Vellore, for the purpose of hearing complaints against the proposed assessments or the accuracy of frontage measurements and any other complaint which persons interested may desire to make and which is by law cognizable by the Court.

Now Mr. Editor I wish to point out that I took the regular steps and appealed against my assessment at the Court of Revision and the result was that my assessment was reduced by twenty-five dollars. They said that my assessment was all right; well maybe it is but if mine is alright there sure must be many others that are not alright.

I firmly believe sir, that if the cases of which I know, and some of which are quoted here are typical of conditions all over the town that it is certainly time we were taking councillor Sloan's idea of revising the assessment.
