Acclamation For Village Council

David Hill Is The New Member of Council

There will not be an election in Richmond Hill this year. Reeve Lunau has been returned for a third term and the entire council was accorded an acclamation with David Hill taking the place of W. G. Baldock who retired. There were only two nominations for the office of reeve, J. Lunau and J. A. Greene and only four nominations for council. It was expected that there would be a contest for the reeveship but Mr. Greene withdrew from the race on Tuesday. Interviewed by the Liberal, Mr. Greene stated that in as much as there was not a contest for the council or for the school board he did not wish to put the municipality to the trouble and expense of an election.

Four were nominated for the three seats on the Richmond Hill Board of Education, Garnet H. Duncan, Frank Atkinson, Harry Endean and Wesley Palmer. Mr. Palmer did not qualify as he stated to The Liberal that he did not feel like causing an election and the three former members were elected by acclamation.

The nomination was graced with only a fair attendance of ratepayers and it was notably quiet, harmonious and devoid of anything in the nature of fireworks. Only one lady was present which was regrettable but may have been accounted for by the fact that many homes were celebrating Christmas on Monday. Mr. A. J. Hume presided in his usual capable and dignified manner and the meeting was orderly and well conducted throughout.

G. H. Duncan chairman of the board of Education, briefly referred to the work of the past years. The board was able to reduce its requisition this year and the same time managed to carry out some permanent improvements and would finish the year in a very satisfactory financial condition. The schools were fortunate in having an excellent staff of teachers he said. He felt confident that the requisition could be further reduced next year by the same careful policy of financing which had been practiced this year.

Reeve Lunau reviewed the work which had been done during the year in the village. He referred to the gravelling of Centre Street; sidewalks constructed, the work on the side streets and promised for next year a revision of the assessment by a good practical and capable man. The drain on

Church Street had been constructed to take care of conditions which were serious and which demanded immediate action. This was the reason it was gone ahead with so late in the season. He stated that he could not tell what the cost of the new pavement on Yonge Street would be as he had not been able to get the figures from the Warren Paving Company. He promised to give his very best service to the Municipality if elected Reeve for 1928.

J. A. Greene criticized the council for constructing drains in early December when the ground was frozen and the cost much above what it would have been if the work had been done under normal conditions. He charged the council with a lack of foresight in this matter. He thought it was poor business for the council to purchase pipe to the extent of \$1100 for the extensions to the waterworks when they were not going to be used until next year. Why lay out the taxpayers money like this when it has to be borrowed at six per cent he asked. He asked why an effort had not been made to dispose of certain equipment which was scrapped when the new electric light system was installed.

In answer to this question, Reeve Lunau said that Mr. Greene had tried to sell it when he was in council and was unable to do so. The council were willing to sell it but could not do so until they got a buyer.

Mr. Greene contended that the Reeve should be able to tell what the road would cost if a proper contract had been made with the Warren Paving Company. He reviewed his efforts on behalf of lower fares on the radials, in having a survey made for industrial plants. He favored lowering our taxes so that people would be attracted to the village in greater numbers.

Councillors—elect David Hill, G. H. Sloan, J. R. Herrington and Jas. McLean, addressed the meeting and thanked the electors for their election for the coming year.
