



SPLENDID REPORT OF LOCAL HIGH SCHOOL

The regular meeting of the Richmond Hill Board of Education on Tuesday night was featured by the presentation of the auditor's report and the report of the inspectors. The auditor's report showed the books and accounts to be in very satisfactory shape and the finances in good standing. The Inspector's report of his inspection of the High School in March was very complimentary, the grading of the accommodation was invariably number I, and his remarks concerning the splendid standing of the school was very gratifying to the board. In his general remarks Inspector Husband said:

"It has been a pleasure for me to visit the Richmond Hill High School and note the fine provision that has been made for carrying on the work of secondary education. The members of the Board as well as the people of the village and the surrounding community are to be congratulated on the interest they have shown in the welfare of the boys and girls; and I trust that the success of those who may be trained in the school from year to year will be in keeping with the sacrifice the community is making to maintain it in its present efficient state.

Principal Stewart is a good organizer and administrator and he is fortunate in having, for the most part, teachers of experience associated with him in the work. However if the school is to get his best service as Principal he should be relieved as soon as possible of work in Physical Culture.

A commendable feature of the work of this school is the interest taken in debating and public speak ing. During my visit I had an op portunity to listen to a very good de

I was also informed that most of the boys and girls are interested in the athletics of the school and this is desirable. Good wholesome sport has ever been a source of strength to the life of any school, as through it the physical well-being of the pupils is promoted and certain lessons, important in their bearing on the future life of the boys and girls, are inculcated almost unconsciously."
