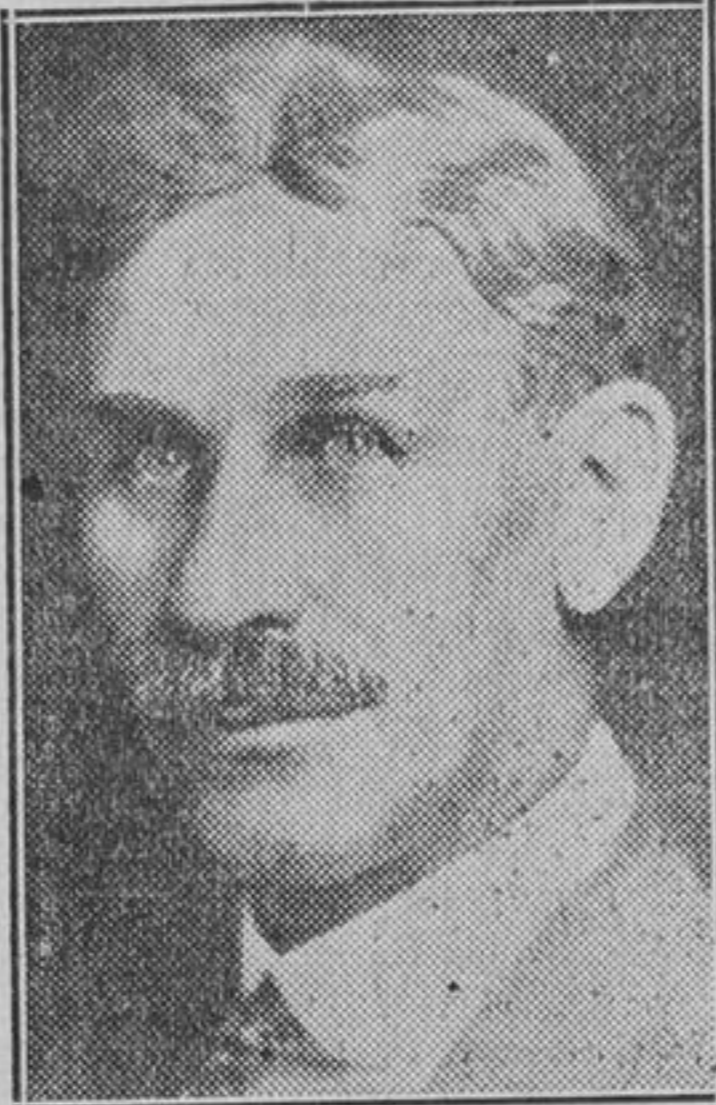

## GENERAL NEWS AND VIEWS



#### HON. PETER HEENAN

Minister of Labor in the Federal Cabinet who was tendered a complimentary banquet by friends in Toronto on Tuesday night. Hon. Senator W. H. McGuire was chairman at the banquet and introduced the honored guest of the evening, Hon. Lucien Cannon, Solicitor-General was one of the speakers.

Roads throughout the County are in very bad condition. Anywhere off the main highways has been well nigh impassable during the past weeks. However after a few fine days when the frosts can be worked there will be a marked improvement.

The weatherman interfered with the traditional annual Easter Fashion Parade on Sunday last. Fur coats and galoshes were more in order than spring toggery.

Richmond Hill citizens are patting themselves on the back that they are fortunate in having Yonge Street paved this year. The side streets are in a bad mess and some are so bad as to be impossible to travel.

Only six weeks until May 24, which for the past seventy-eight years has been Richmond Hill's big day. It is not too early to start boosting the Richmond Hill Spring Fair.

The few fine days which we have enjoyed this spring have made the gardening enthusiasts uneasy and many have taken a stroll around and given the lot the "once-over." A local enthusiast says "it won't be long now."

At a well attended meeting of the Lansing Ladies' Athletic Club held Thursday evening at the home of Mr. and Mrs. A. Maltby, Mrs. E.W. Clover was elected president for the third successive year.

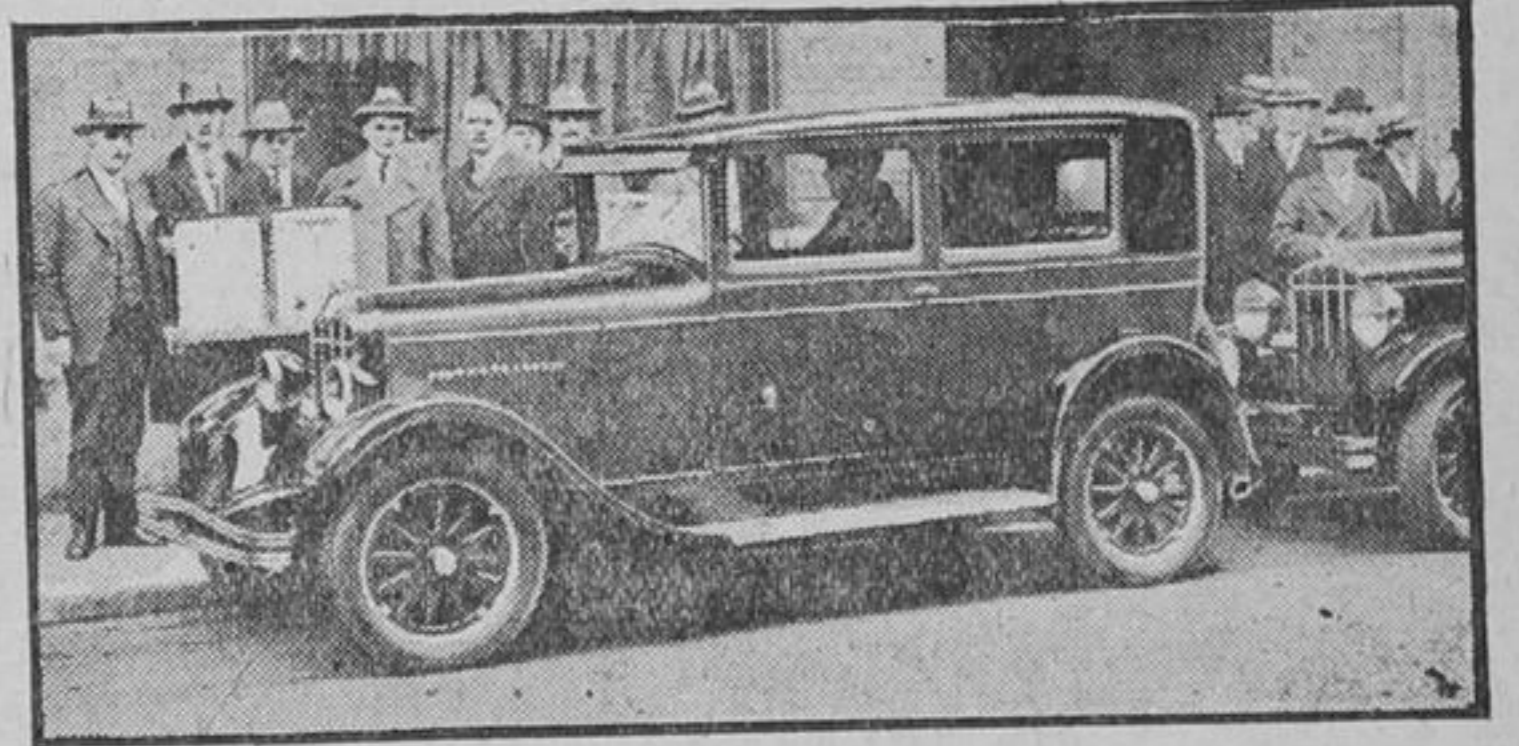

Mrs. Walter Runciman has been elected to the British parliament, of which her husband is also a member. This is the first time husband and wife have been so honored.

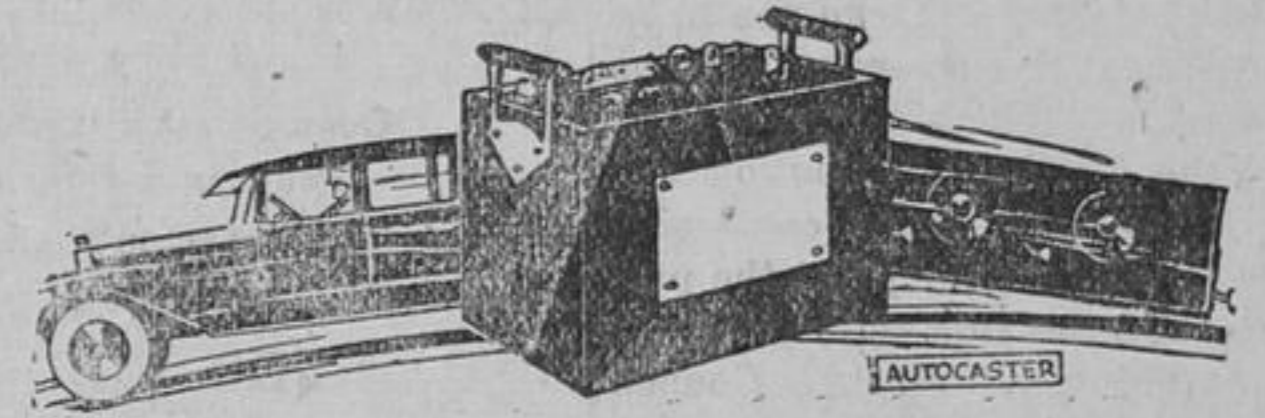
Mrs. Ruth Demarest of Chicago testified in her divorce suit that after her husband drove her from home he refused to talk to her except through the window.
