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GENERAL NEWS AND VIEWS

CUT YOUR SOW THISTLE NOW is the timely warning given in this issue by R. J. Rogers York County representative of the Department of Agriculture.

Monday next, August 6 will be observed as Civic Holiday in Richmond Hill and the majority of centres throughout York County and this section of the province.

There are some three hundred guests at the Toronto Municipal Farm, Langstaff, at the present time. The institution has accommodation for about three hundred and thirty, but the number at present there constitutes a record for this time of the year.

Traffic was exceptionally heavy over the week-end on Yonge Street. Three traffic officers were on duty at the York Mills hill during the evening in an endeavour to keep the stream of cars on the move. As usual the "cut in" artist was in evidence and caused lots of trouble for himself and everyone else.

One killed, nine injured and fourteen motor cars either smashed or ditched was the automobile toll in Toronto's suburban districts over the week-end.

Nine cars were ditched on Yonge street Sunday evening, between Schomberg Junction and Thornhill, a distance of nine miles. A car a mile.

The King George Hotel, Newmarket has been sold by the Newmarket Hotel Company to Cecil Grant for a price in the neighborhood of \$17,000. Mr. Grant, who until this spring owned and operated a hotel at Orchard Beach, will occupy the King George on August 1, and will continue to run it as a public house.

Progress and development which has taken place in Canada during the past ten years and a bright future in store for the country under Liberal leadership were points stressed by speakers at the third annual picnic of Ward Eight Liberal Association held at Scarborough Heights Park on Saturday afternoon. Despite lowering clouds and more than a hint of rain, nearly 2,000 people gathered at the grounds.

The heaviest passenger traffic so far this summer was carried Sunday on the Metropolitan division of the T. T. C., when almost 5,000 persons rode on the North Yonge Street radials.

The Toronto and York Highway Commission is pushing the work of road construction on the 8th concession from Burkholder's Corners to Dickson's Hill, a distance of two and one half miles, and which is part of the work undertaken when the 6th concession of Markham was taken over by the township council of that municipality. The Jupp Construction Company has the work in hand, and when this is done, about the middle of August, the mile and a quarter between Wellington Street in Markham Village, and George Cowie's, will be started.

840 men have been employed daily on the construction of the new Royal York Hotel Toronto, the past two weeks and every effort is being made to finish the work as close to May 19-29, as possible.

Leo Cook, of Lemonville, and Samuel Cook, of King Township, half brothers, met for the first time in twenty-five years at the funeral of their uncle the late Jos. Cook in Stouffville last week.

Preparations are being made for the building of the road between Nobleton and Schomberg. It is understood that the construction will be of the Provincial road type. Many men are at present engaged in laying tile.

An editor in one of the States across the border has just received a capital prize of \$1,000 from one of the big magazines for giving the best answer to the following question: "What does my town need the most?" The editor's prize winning answer was, "Six or eight funerals rightly placed."

It has been estimated according to Stouffville Tribune that there is over \$1,000,000 in savings in the Stouffville branch of the Standard Bank.

Mr. J. W. Brown, school teacher at Dickson's Hill last term, has taken the school on the third line of Markham, south of Gormley, designated S. S. No. 4.

A spark from a heap of boxes which were being burned in the grounds on Yonge street was given as the cause of a small fire on the property of McLaughlin's bottling plant at York Mills last Friday morning. A small part of the roof was burned, doing about \$200 to \$300 damage. The North York fire department soon had the fire under control. The loss is said to be covered by insurance.

An inspector of the Toronto Humane Society is gathering stray dogs in the northwestern suburbs following an agreement between the society and York township. Citizens have been given the idea that animals are caught in a net and frightened, which is not the case, officials say. They are caught humanely and pets which are taken are none the worse for their adventure when reclaimed by their owners.

John Cruickshank has been appointed by acclamation as chairman of the North York Township High School Board. Walter C. Spracklin is deputy chairman. James V. Batchelor acted as secretary at Thursday night's organization meeting. No one has as yet been permanently appointed to this position. Mr. Cruickshank stated that plans will have to provide for the accommodation of approximately 100 High school students, as there are already 36 in the continuation school, and 66 more who passed their entrance examination will be coming in after the summer vacation.

For the second time in two weeks lightning on Friday last struck the spire of St. Andrew's Presbyterian church, Newmarket. About two weeks ago the south side of the tower was struck and about \$400 damage done.

The condition of the 9th concession of Whitechurch is the subject of much unfavorable comment. Some time ago work was done on this township road, and farmers now allege that it is in worse condition than before the work was done on it.

The North York Hunter Field trials to encourage the breeding and sale of hunters to be held at Mr. Jarvis' farm Hazelburn, on Saturday, Sept 8th, has already attracted a large number of entries. Four entries have been received from different parts of the United States, one from Montreal with a possibility of five more from the same place and 26 have already been received from Toronto. Excellent prizes are being offered and the event will undoubtedly be a big success.

Mr. Robt. Miller is draining the newly acquired lands which he recently added to his farm in Whitechurch at Ringwood, and is putting down some eighteen thousand tile.

Farm communities of Ontario have not been backward in accepting the assistance of the Ontario Government and grants have reached about \$25,000 toward the erection of some 73 halls and the laying out of 12 community playing fields. The Government grants 25 per cent. of the total cost of the hall up to \$8,000. The maximum grant is \$2,000. According to the statistics of the department the various farming communities that have taken advantage of the legislation have spent over half a million dollars on community halls.
