Work on the Newmarket High School is progressing. The foundation is all in and about five feet of bricks have been laid in the new addition. The boilers have been set in position and the boiler room walls are rising around them. The coal rooms are being made to drive into with the coal onto a cement top and drop the coal through a chute. Having the boiler room outside the school lessens the danger of fire. It will be separated by fire doors. The plumbers are on the job and keeping up with the other construction. Girders are now on the grounds and the warped ones will be taken out of the front wing. When they are placed work will be resumed on the reconstruction to have it ready for occupancy as soon as possible. There is a large number of workmen and the contractors are pushing the work. At the last report it would be completed

by not later than November. When it is finished it will be a fine addition to the town and the school will be among the best in the province.
