

representing the Jones Lumber Company, Richmond Hill, enjoyed a very delightful trip through the Gyproc plant at Caledonia. The party left and drove by chartered bus along the Lake-shore road via Hamilton to Caladonia. On arrival the party was taken to the mine which is about eightyfive feet below the surface. There they found the very hard grey rock which is mined and manufactured into Gyproc and other products. The mine The evenings entertainment consis- is cut about six feet deep and about twenty feet wide and is carried by rail

The rock first goes through a crusher and is ground to a fine powder and from this is taken such products as plaster paris plaster and gypsum. The gypsum is then taken to the different machines and thoroughly mixed before it is put in the paper and press. The whole process is a very interesting one and it is marvellous to witness the many steps leading to the large piles when it is ready for shipment.
