CANADA IS NO MEAL TICKET

The fuss kicked up by a small group of aggitators among the British miner group of immigrants is thankfully not typical of the group. The magic lamp of Canada has to be rubbed before its magic can be seen. The men who are looking for free meals are not wanted here any more than they are where they came from. Each country has within itself sufficient of that type of individuals.
