## GENERAL NEWS AND VIEWS

Writs have been issued for the bye election in the Federal constituency of West York, Ont. Nomination day has been set for Monday, October 29 with polling one week later, on Monday, November 5th. The seat has been vacant since the resignation of Sir Henry Drayton to accept the chairmanship of the Ontario Liquor Commission. Sir Henry was elected in West York in 1921 and held the constituency until his resignation, toward the latter end of the last session of parliament.

The International plowing match, to be held October 9 to 12 on the Carmichael Farm, north of London, is expected to be the largest yet. There is a prize list of \$7,000 and 300 plowmen are expected to compete. An attendance of 50,000 is looked for.

Carloads of potatoes are being shipped daily from Uxbridge station just now, and the farmers are only receiving 55¢ per bag, a mighty slim price, even if the crop is large.

Losing control of the borrowed car which he was driving on the North Yonge Street hill at Holland Landing, John Singley, of 10 Dulliver Street, Toronto, had a miraculous escape from serious injury on Sunday night. The car skidded across the road for a distance of over twenty feet, left the pavement and turned over in a deep ditch. The glass in all the windows was shattered, the wheels were broken and two doors almost completely torn off.

The analysis made by Prof. Rogers of the provincial laboratories, throws no light on the cause of death of Albert Butler, the elderly man who was found dead in a hut at the Toronto Airway aerodrome, Dufferin Street, on the morning of September 14. Dr. C.S. Dunning, coroner for North York has received the report, and is making further inquiries before calling an inquest.

Canada leads the world in increased prosperity over a period of seven years.

The Markham High School Board are having some difficulty in securing a teacher for the commercial department, which has recently been inaugurated in the school. However they are hoping to have matters satisfactorily arranged at an early date.

In the last twenty-five years Canadian manufacturing products jumped from 241 to 1,311 million dollars. Her forest production increased nearly four times and her foreign trade increased by 1,882 million dollars.

During the great war much of the forest land of Great Britain was denuded of its heavy timber and even younger growth was brought into requisition. Mr. Bull is replacing the loss at the rate of 23,000 acres per year, a total of 114,000 acres have been planted in Great Britain since reforestation was started after the war, and over 300,000 acres of plantable land have been acquired.

This annual field meet of Newmarket, Aurora, Richmond Hill and Markham High Schools will be held on Saturday, October 13th, on the Markham fair grounds. It is expected there will be keen competition to win the A.J.H. Eckardt beautiful trophy. This trophy is competed for annually. In 1925 it was won by Newmarket, in 1926 jointly by Aurora and Newmarket, and in 1927 by Aurora.

Windsor may join with other Ontario cities in a protest to the provincial government against the proposed increase in the government's gasoline tax, recently announced by Premier Ferguson. The proposal to make the gas tax 5 cents a gallon instead of 3 is opposed from the standpoint of the city driver who seldom uses government highways, and as a measure that would operate unfairly in the case of American tourists, whom the province seeks to attract.

William Minton, died at Maple on Thursday, September 27 in his 71st year. The funeral took place from his late residence to Maple cemetery on Saturday afternoon.

Many old residents of the county attended the funeral of Archibald McCallum, who was buried in King cemetery. He was born in King town-

ship, York county, and died in his sixty-sixth year. He gave up farming eight years ago, and had been living in Aurora for five years. In his younger days he was a member of King township council and served in York County Council. He took an active part in politics as a Conservative and opposed Sir Allen Aylesworth in a by-election in the federal riding of North York. He was a member of the Presbyterian church, a justice of the peace, a member of Robertson Lodge A.F. & A.M. He was unmarried and is survived by one brother and two sisters.

Graduation exercises of the training school of nursing in connection with the York County hospital training school were held in the town hall last week. The nurses who graduated this year were Ethel Taylor, of Cedar Brae; Jane Harriett Holmes and Eva Wright Holmes, of Schomberg; Thelma Mary Hodgins and Mrs. Olive Jackson, of Newmarket. Rev. A.E. Marshall opened the exercises with the invocation. The chairman, P.W. Pearson, M. P. P., congratulated the class and compared past and present conditions in connection with the nursing profession. Mr. Pearson drew attention to the work done during the past year at the hospital. There had been four hundred and one patients admitted, seventy-four births had taken place in the hospital and there were sixty-six major operations sixty-nine minor operations and seventeen emergency accident cases.

### Agricultural District Representative Resigns

R. J. ROGERS SEVERS CONNECTION WITH AGRICULTURAL DEPARTMENT

Keen regret will be felt throughout the County of York on the announced retirement of R. J. Rogers from the office of District Representative of the Department of Agriculture to accept the office of district manager of the London Life Insurance Company for the Counties of York, Peel, Simcoe and Dufferin.

Mr. Rogers has been a most capable agricultural representative and he will be greatly missed in this County where his efforts on behalf of Agricultural pursuits and especially dealing with work among the young people was very successful and highly appreciated.

Mr. Rogers resignation was effective October 1st but he will carry on until his successor is appointed.

Mr. Rogers, who is familiarly known all over the county as "Rusty," was born on a farm near New Lowell, in the county of Simcoe. At the beginning of the war he enlisted and went overseas with the first contingent and served for four and one-half years, receiving decorations on the field. On his return to Canada he took a course at the Ontario Agricultural College and graduated with honors in 1922, winning the highest scholarship obtainable there. Mr. Rogers is known particularly among the Junior farmers. In his work among the latter he has coached stock judging teams that have made a reputation for themselves in the province, winning no less than four Ontario championships and two competitions at the Guelph Winter Fair.
