GENERAL NEWS AND VIEWS

Water users in Alliston are due for the present of a receipted account for a quarter's charge. The utility commission has a satisfactory balance on hand and rather than make any change in rates has decided to give its patrons free water for the months of July, August and September. It means a matter of about \$700 to the people of Alliston who use the town water.

After a series of tests, the Ontario Department of Highways has decided to change the color of the motor markers for the year 1929. It was originally intended to use the same combination of colors that was used this year—black letters and figures on a yellow background. Further experiments have convinced the Department however, that under traffic conditions a new color scheme would probably provide better visibility. As a result the markers for 1929 will be composed of a "battleship" grey background with black letter and figures.

TIRE CONVENTION ADDRESSED BY THE HON. CHAS. STEWART, MINISTER OF INTERIOR, AND W. A. EDEN

Whitchurch Council

The regular meeting of Whitchurch Township Council was held at Vandorf on Saturday, Sept. 29th, with all members present and Reeve M. Baker in the chair.

A deputation composed of Messrs Jesse Cook, Lloyd Turner and Elmer Ferguson, representing the North York Plowmen's Association requested a grant. On motion of Councillor Crawford and Williams, the Treasurer was instructed to issue a cheque for \$50 as a grant towards prize list of the North York plowing match.

On motion of Councillors Ratcliff and Crawford a grant of \$35 was made towards the Whitchurch Twp. School Fair.

A by-law permitting the town of Aurora to lay water mains on Old Yonge Street in Township of Whitchurch was introduced by Councillor Crawford, and after receiving the necessary readings and passed.

Claims for compensation for sheep killed and injured by dogs were made by Messrs Geo. Druery and I.N. Morton.

On motion of Councillors G. W. Williams and Ross E. Ratcliff the claim of Geo. Druery for \$90 for seven sheep killed by dogs was ordered paid.

On motion of Councillor W. Crawford and Deputy Reeve Kidd, the treasurer was instructed to pay to Isaac N. Morton, \$62 for 3 sheep and one lamb killed and damaged to flock.

On motion of Councillors Crawford and Ratcliff, notice was given that at the regular meeting a by-law will be introduced to appoint a permanent clerk and treasurer for the Township of Whitchurch.

On motion of Councillors Ratcliff and Crawford, the following bondsmen: A. B. Steckley, W. J. Pattenden, and J. A. Clarke as offered by Frank Steckley, tax collector, were accepted as satisfactory to the council.

On motion of Councillors Crawford and Ratcliff, Geo. H. Sproxtton was allowed \$50 for deviation road around culvert built on 5th con. line opposite lot 25.

On motion of Councillors Williams and Crawford, D. Hartford was allowed an advance of \$300, being part payment for construction of bridges on 7th con. line, opposite lots 3 and 4.

On motion of Councillors Ratcliff and Crawford a number of bills and accounts were ordered paid:

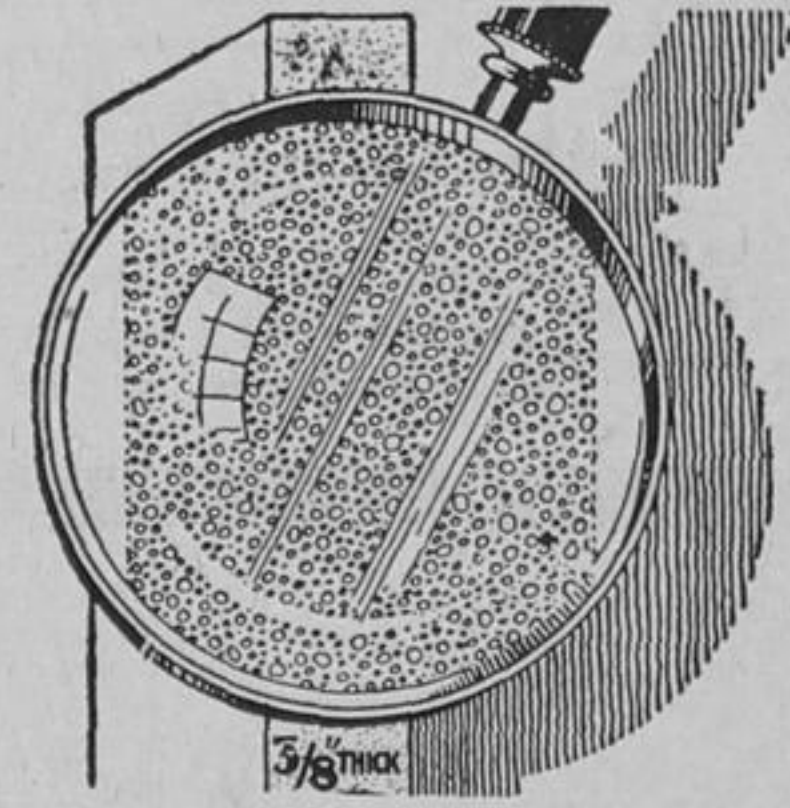
