An Avalanche of Ballots Defeats All 1928 Councillors


Reeve J. Lunau Survives and Was Re-Elected By Increased Majority.

There was a landslide in the municipal elections in Richmond Hill on Monday last which carried to defeat three members of the 1928 council, but re-elected Reeve J. Lunau to his fourth term as chief magistrate of the village. Reeve Lunau polled a splendid vote in a hotly contested race for the reeveship and had a formidable opponent in ex-councillor J. A. Greene who polled 195 votes which was forty three less than polled for the victorious candidate. Frank Sims headed the poll for councillor receiving 251 votes which was thirteen more than recorded for the winner of the reeveship. Wes Middleton finished a close second with 242 votes, Fred J. Mansbridge third with 235 and Harry Davis was elected with a vote of 212. The four councillors elect are all well known locally and all will be serving on the municipal council for the first time.
