REGULAR SESSION VAUGHAN COUNCIL

Vaughan Township council met in regular session on Tuesday afternoon with Reeve Robson in the chair and seated around the table Deputy-Reeve J. T. Saigeon, Deputy Reeve Thomas M. Baker, councillors William J. Johnson and Robert Dooks. Several requests for gravel were heard and anxious as the council members are to see the roads fixed up they explained to the various deputations that as there was so much money expended after December 15, 1928 which had to come out of this year's appropriations that they had to go easy in promising and work.

F. H. Cole, of Spruce Avenue wrote regarding an alleged nuisance on his street, which complaint was referred to the Board of Health.

It was agreed after some discussion that the price to be paid for gravel would be 25 cents per yard and that any special cases of departures from this price are to be referred to the whole council. There was considerable discussion concerning the use of trucks and the use of teams for hauling gravel. Road Supt. McDonald pointed out that 879 yards of gravel was placed on the second concession by teams at a cost of \$1543.25 whereas by truck, first class screened gravel could have been put on the road for a cost of \$1000, or at a saving on that one job of \$543. Councillor Dooks said he made the statement that the truck was a white elephant and he was still of the same opinion. He said any work he had to do he would make sure he got value for his money and if the teams could do it as cheaply as the trucks that the ratepayers would get the work every time.

A sheep claim of \$77.00 was paid G. McNair being made up as follows; 1 sheep \$20., 2 sheep \$34., 1 sheep \$15 and one at \$8.00.

Messrs Ernest Carson and T. E. Weldrick appeared asking that a grant be made for some graveling on the fifth concession. It was pointed out that this section had nothing for some time and that it was badly needed. They estimated that probably \$300. would do the job and that with a little fall of snow the work could be done now getting the gravel from Wilson's pit. Councillor Johnson explained the position of the financial appropriation for his district but promised to seriously consider the request. Regarding a suggestion to do some patching, Mr. Weldrick said it would be an utter waste of good money. Councillor Johnson pointed out that the fifth north of the Maple side-road needed attention and he did not know if there would be enough money to grant the request of the committee or not.

It was decided to haul some gravel now and place it in piles on Tibbet's side-road between the eighth and ninth. Wilfred Sloan appeared on behalf of this request. This work in Councillor Dook's section.

A communication was received from the East Vaughan Ratepayers Association asking that the council take some action to secure the land necessary for the construction of sidewalks at certain places between Richmond Hill and Thornhill. The council pointed out that action on this matter was under way by the County Council, which acting on a resolution sponsored by Reeve Gohn of Markham and Deputy-Reeve Baker of Vaughan will approach the Department of Highways in an endeavour to have the Province undertake the provision of the land necessary for sidewalks. A change in voting hours at election day was also mentioned in the communication from the ratepayers association but any action on this subject was left until later in the year.

A communication was received from the Standard Bank, Thornhill complaining of the flooding of their cellar brought about it was claimed by gravel placed on the roadway opened at the rear of their lot. Plans were discussed for relieving the situation at this corner as soon as weather conditions will permit.

The council will attend the Ontario Good Roads Association meeting in Toronto at the end of February.
