Mrs. Cline Burr gave a euchre party to a number of friends on Wednesday, February 20th.

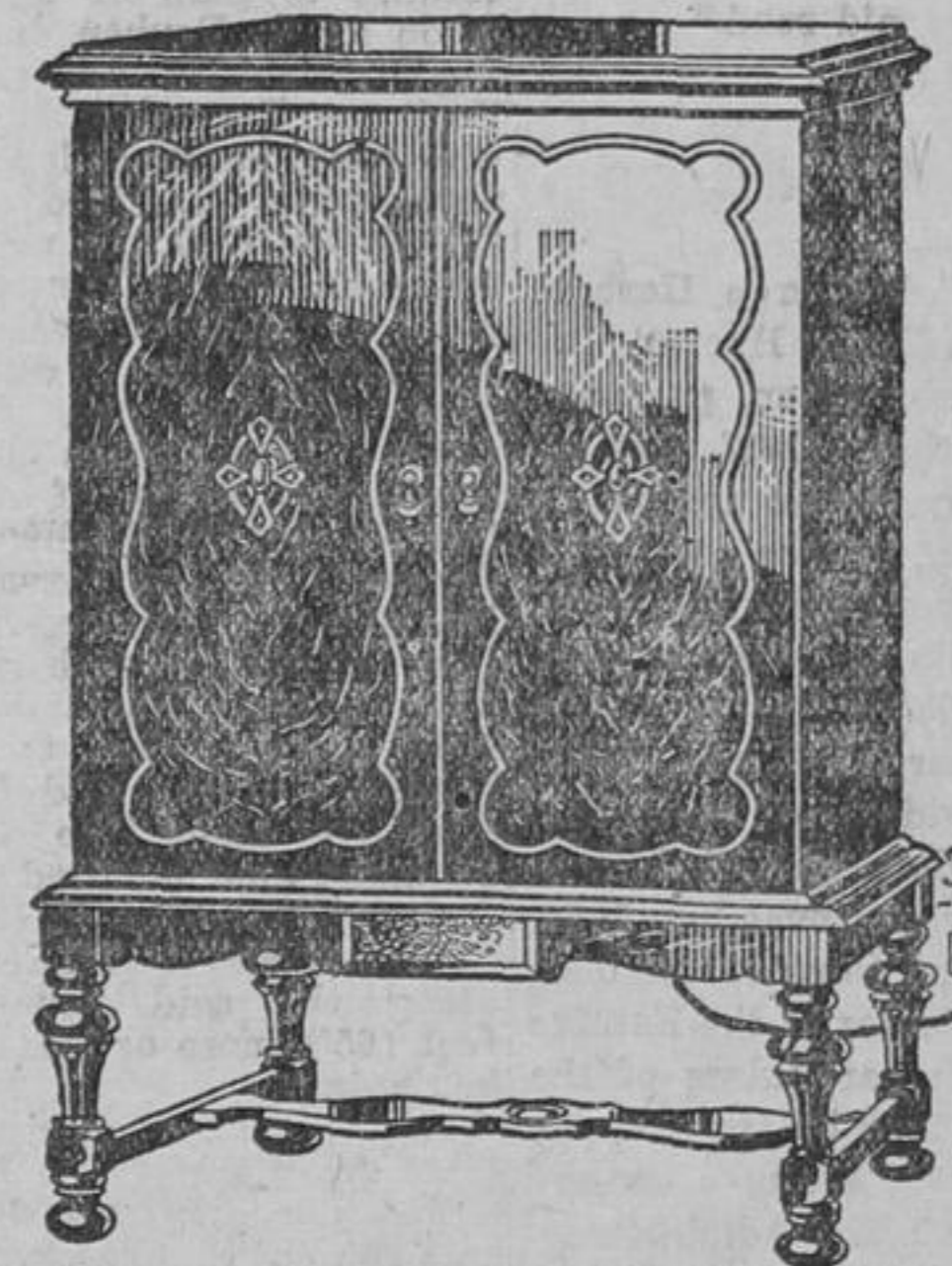
Mr. Walter Craig and Mr. Norman Reid had tea with Mr. John Young on Sunday.
