London, March 13—(Star Special Wireless by J. E. Poole, Staff Correspondent)—The Financial News says: "T. B. Macaulay's exposition of the Sun Life of Canada's investment policy will have a direct appeal here. He ascribes the company's success and continued growth to four factors—cautious and economical agency management, careful selection of risks, building up of protective reserves out of earnings, and specialization in safe and profitable investment of its funds. When one comes to dealing with sums like a hundred million pounds, and when a difference of one per cent. in average yield means a difference of a Million pounds a year, it is clear that within the limits of safety the reward to all concerned is too great to be sacrificed to a policy of routine.

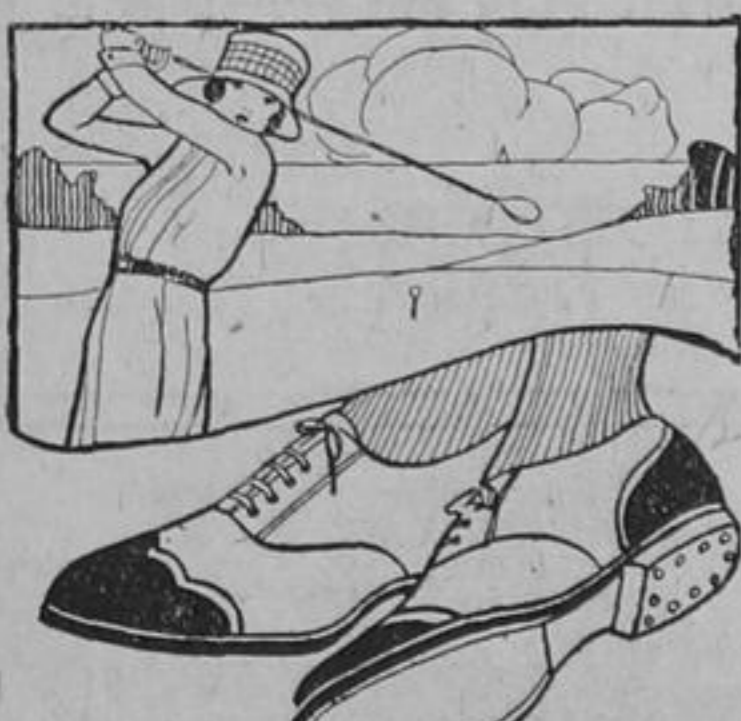

The sales were all recorded in Pounds, Shillings and Pence and the total receipts were 113 pounds, 6 shillings and 1d. Mr. B. Barnard officiated as auctioneer and the selling price of many articles suffer by comparison with the prices which Mr. J. T. Saigeon secures at auction sales throughout Vaughan township to-day.

Two great coats sold for 1£ 3S, 5 pair of stockings brought 12 S, a buck saw brought 2 S, a tub of grease sold for 4 S, a cradle scythe sold for 3 S, a barrel of salt brought 5 S, a Dutch Bible sold for 3£ 18S, a coffee mill 5S, 6d, a Testament 3S, 6d, a bedstead bolsters and pillows 3£ 2S, a wagon 11£ 15S, one cow 4£ 7S 6d, two calves 2£ 13S, a Yoke of Oxen sold for 10£, one steer 5£, one fanning mill 4£ 17S 6d.

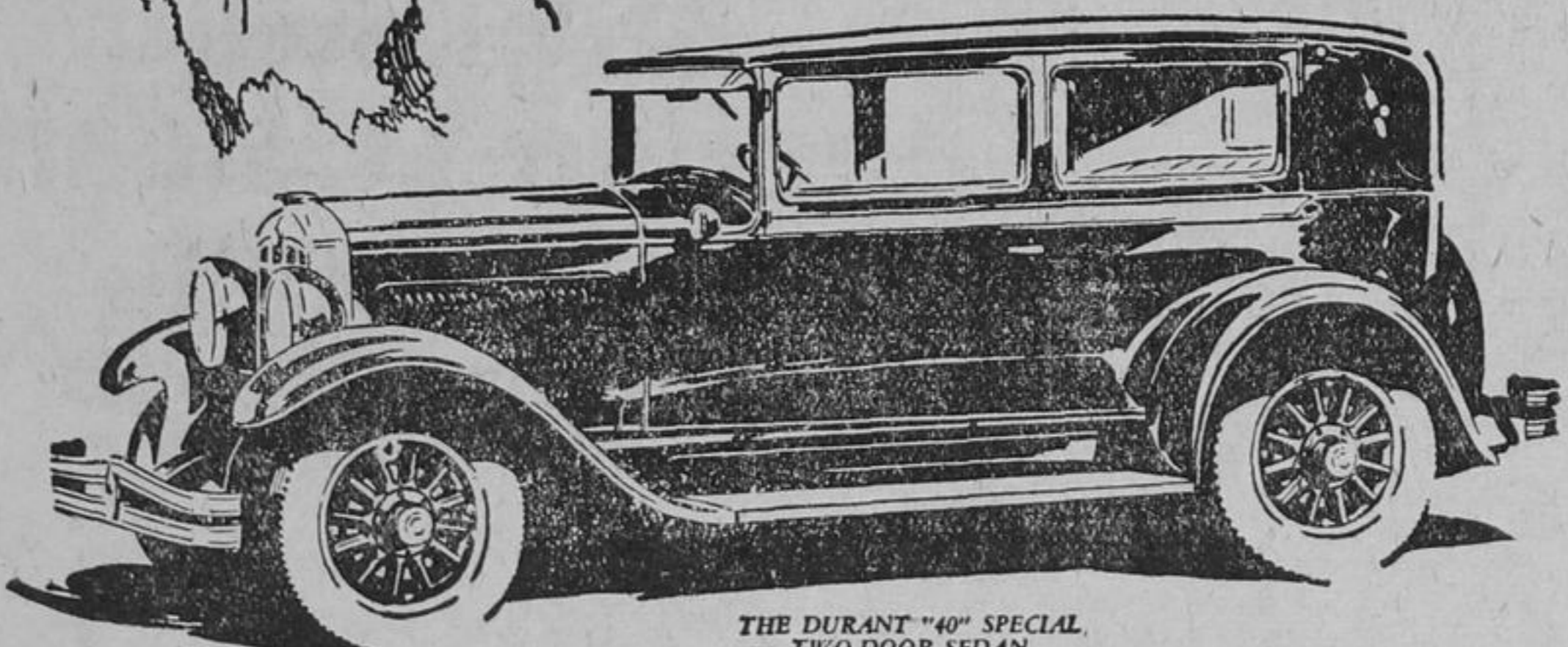
