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GENERAL NEWS AND VIEWS

Beatty Bros., of Fergus, are proceeding at once with the plans for the erection of the outside swimming pool to be placed at the disposal of Fergus swimmers. They have already purchased the land and two separate pools of concrete, one for children and one for expert swimmers will be available.

Toronto Township Council at its last meeting accepted the tender of John Pearson for five bridges in the township at \$14 per cubic yard, including all labor and materials excepting steel.

At the late Session there was before parliament a bill to amend the Elections Act. It is a lengthy bill and revises the whole act quite thoroughly from the question of issuing writs and enumeration down to the routine details of making returns. There are, however, two new features in the Act. One is that the afternoon of election day shall be a holiday. This is a provision that was included in the last revision of the act and omitted by a clerical error when it was sent on to the Senate. Another provision that has been talked of before but nothing definite done is to provide for permanent returning officers.

The forty-eighth convention of the Vaughan Township Sabbath School Association was held in Woodbridge United Church. The Telephone Company are putting up new poles through the village and are going to have the wires removed and replaced by cables.


