Canadian Pacific steamer Minnedosa recently brought over to Canada two fine stallions belonging to the Prince of Wales, "Aldebaran" an Arab, and "Crusader", a Clyde, to go the royal ranch at High River, Alberta. The two horses broke their journey at the Toronto Exhibition, and later were carried across the Dominion by Canadian Pacific Express. Special accommodation was provided for them on the Minnedosa.

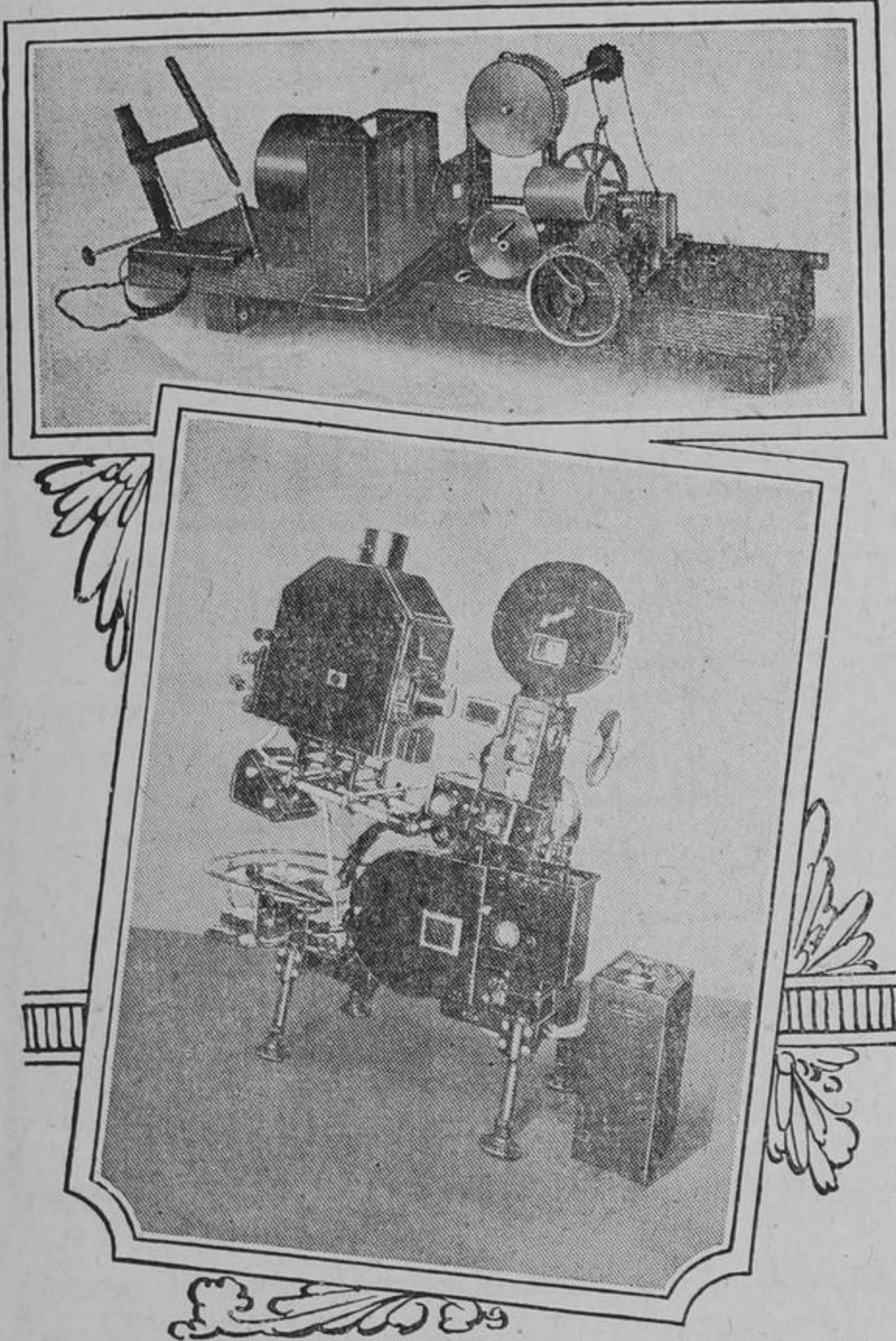
Rt. Hon. L. C. M. S. Amery, secretary for the Dominions in the Baldwin administration, fulfilled his wish recently when he climbed Mount Amery, 10,940-foot peak in the Rockies, to accomplish which he had travelled some six thousand miles by Canadian Pacific Express of Australia and lines to Lake Louise from England. He fought his way through blizzards and many other hardships to the top of the peak. He was accompanied by a Swiss guide, Edward Feuz, of Lake Louise.

Canadians are the world's greatest butter eaters. A recent compilation made by the Canadian Government Bureau of Statistics shows that the total consumption of butter in the Dominion last year was 230,000,000 pounds or a per capita consumption for the year of 29.31 pounds, an increase of nearly half a pound per head of population compared with 1927.

J. M. R. Fairbairn, chief engineer, Canadian Pacific Railway, and Dr. F. A. Gaby, chief engineer, Ontario Hydro-Electric Commission, have been selected as Canadian delegates to the Tokio sectional session of the World's Power Conference to be held in Japan in October. They were nominated at a meeting of Canada's executive conference committee.

The steady increase in the use of electric power per capita in Canada is shown by a comparison of the figures for 1920 and 1927. During this period the amount of power used per 100 of population increased from 43 to 63 horse-power, or the use of power per inhabitant increased over 46 per cent.

Thirty-five years ago the sixth of June last, in a jeweller's shop in a small town across the border, a young U.S. Government clerk, C. Francis Jenkins, using the machine pictured above, which he had just invented, staged the first public exhibition of moving pictures in America.

It remained, however, for the telephone engineer and the scientist, trained in the electrical trans-

mission of sound, to make possible sound picture equipment.

Apparatus similar in all respects to that which has already been installed by Northern Electric engineers in the leading theatres from coast to coast throughout Canada, has also been placed in the large theatres in England, France, Germany, India, Australia, New Zealand, Brazil, West Indies, Central America, China, Japan and some 2,500 in the United States.
