GENERAL NEWS AND VIEWS

Toronto, Richmond Hill and suburban areas revert to STANDARD TIME next Sunday morning.

The electors are wondering why Mr Ferguson fixed the date of the election as October 30th, just one day before the annual returns of the Liquor Control Board are due. Can it be that the proportions of the liquor business for last year would be such a shock to the people that he is afraid of the result?

On Friday, September 13th, David Watson, of Goodwood, held a sale of dairy cattle which realized \$3347. The top price for a cow was \$160.

Clifford Case, of Aurora, is mentioned as the likely candidate in the provincial riding of North York, in the Conservative interests. P. W. Pearson, Liberal, who represented the riding in the last legislature will probably again be a candidate and is assured of strong support for re-election.

Goslett's hardware store in Newmarket was broken into by thieves last week and some money and a quantity of ammunition was stolen.

We venture that one of Mr. Ferguson's fondest wishes at the moment is that the present election should be featured by numerous three cornered contests. The one sure way to guarantee the return of the Ferguson Government is for those in opposition to split their forces.

Nova Scotia is having a plebiscite on the liquor issue on Thursday, October 31st. Mr. Ferguson has so set the election date in Ontario that the dry verdict expected there will have no effect on his own chances of re-election here.

Several frosts were reported throughout the district last week.

A number of store and house burglaries have been reported in Beaverton.

On Sunday, September 15th the ninety-fourth anniversary services were observed at Temperanceville United Church.

The Rouge bridge on the 8th concession of Markham, just south of the Wideman Mennonite church, is still sinking as a result of the bad storm last spring which washed away a great quantity of the dirt about the abutment on the south-west corner.

The village council of Sutton have authorized a by-law to borrow \$50,000 for the construction of a new Continuation school, as requested by the school board of the village.

The town of Kingsville has been assessed the sum of \$2000 due to the fact that a woman of that town died of typhoid fever contracted through drinking contaminated water. The onus for pure water is thus placed on the municipality for supplying the right kind of water for the citizens.

A giant cornstalk grown by Lloyd Watson, measuring fourteen feet four inches occupies a prominent position lashed to a telephone pole on main street, Woodbridge, opposite H. N. Smith's clothing store. It is but one of many taken from the field where it grew.

The Trench Block on Yonge Street, Richmond Hill, has been brightened this week with an attractive coat of paint. The brick work has all been painted a light cream and the store fronts are trimmed in a rich mahogany color. It is a notable improvement to Richmond Hill's main street.

The Conservative convention for the riding of East York will be held at the R. H. MacGregor School on Saturday, September 28th and it is a foregone conclusion that Hon. G. S. Henry will be named the candidate.

The removal of the old board fence at the park has been much appreciated. Now for a little beautification of the park itself and the removal of the unsightly lock-up form the main entrance.

The wrecking operations at the theatre building were rushed with remarkable speed and the building has now been completely demolished and moved away.

A provincial election is likely in New Brunswick on October 31st.

A news item mentions the case of a New York man who started life as an errand boy and has now been made editor. This just shows the danger of starting life as an errand boy.

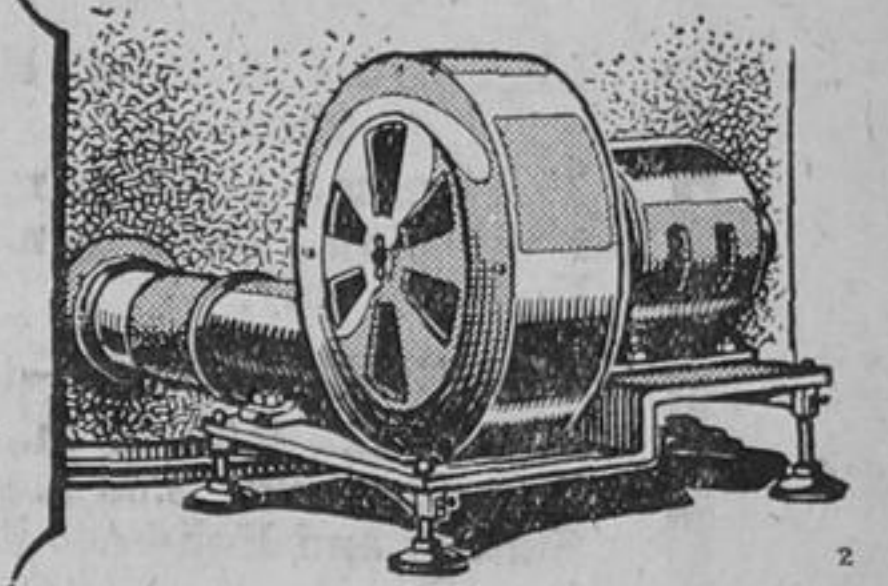
