
TWO SIZES ARE BETTER-

Water for Hens

One hundred hens that electric poles down. are laying should consume about four these facts it is apparent that the water supply is particularly important, more so during the winter months. Failure to supply water properly hinders digestion and will cause constipation, with a resultant curtailment of egg production.

Protects Fruit Trees

Two methods are adopted at the Central Experimental Farm to protect fruit trees from injury through being girdled by mice and rabbits. The first one is to wrap the trunks of the trees with building paper, and the other one is to encircle the trunk with a wire protector with a small enough mesh to prevent a mouse from going through it. In either case the paper or protectors must be put close to the ground, or better still, set in a shovelful of cinders. These forms of protection should be put on now, particularly on trees up to six inches in dia-


