D. Stowell, of Alden, N. Y., who headed the party, to the New Brunswick Government Bureau of Information and Tourist Travel.

Contract for building a 5,500,000 bushel grain elevator at Prescott, Ontario, on the St. Lawrence has recently been let by the Canadian Government. Its cost will be about \$3,100,000 and construction must be completed by August 1, 1930. It is hoped it will be ready before the \$120,000,000 is opened before next year's grain harvest in Western

Canada begins. Official report on employment in Canada states that in October of this year conditions were exceptionally satisfactory. Reports from 7027 employers with staffs totalling 1,089,583 persons, showed employment at 125, based on the average for the calendar year as 100. This is the highest on record for the time of year and compares with 118.8 for October 1, 1928.
