Markham Council Asks That Department Move Fences To Allow Building of Sidewalks

HUNDRED DOLLAR REWARD GIVEN FOR CAPTURE OF CHICKEN THIEF

WILL CONSIDER INCREASE FOR ROAD SUPERINTENDENT

That the need for some action regarding sidewalks on Yonge Street has the attention of municipal legislators was evidenced by a discussion of the subject at the first meeting of the Markham Township Council on Monday. The council took this important matter up at their first meeting and with such a good start it can be reasonably hoped that some appreciable progress will be made during 1930.

The council on Monday, on motion of Deputy-Reeves R. L. Stiver and G. B. Padgett passed the following resolution: "Whereas conditions existing on Yonge Street which is a provincial highway, demand that sidewalks or footpaths be laid down, and the Provincial government has acquired certain land on the west side of the highway on which the fences have not been removed, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Department of Public Highways be notified that as soon as said department removes the fences the Township of Markham is willing to carry on the work of building sidewalks on Yonge Street."

The Department has at various times intimated that it was willing to co-operate with the municipalities in providing sidewalks on Yonge Street and it is hoped that the authorities will now remove any obstacle which are now in the way of the immediate carrying on of this long over-due necessity in the interests of public safety.

The inaugural meeting was presided over by Reeve W. C. Gohn and all the members were present. The session was featured by harmony and despatch in the transaction of the business, and the members adjourned at an early hour.

Reeve Gohn suggested that the council consider the advisability of increasing the salary of the road superintendent. He pointed out that the present salary of \$1200. per year was inadequate and that he felt the man

would not be overpaid at \$1500. The government pays one half the salary of the road superintendent. The superintendent has driven his car as far as 800 miles per month in the execution of his duties. The council will probably deal with the question at the next meeting.

The Board of Health members were appointed as follows: Reeve Gohn, Dr. C. R. McKay, M. O. H., James A. Gibson, G. A. M. Davison, Secretary. Mr. and Mrs. W. Luesby, of Thornhill, were allowed a reward of \$100. for the capture of a chicken thief recently. It will be recalled that a couple of weeks ago Mr. and Mrs. Leusby captured and turned over to the authorities a chicken thief who was in the act of raiding their chicken roost. The intruder has since been sentenced to two years in Kingston and the township in accordance with a motion made some time ago voted the reward.

A grant of fifteen dollars was made to the Thornhill Public Library, Richmond Hill Library and Unionville Library.

On motion of Deputy-Reeve Padgett and Councillor Coakwell, the Reeve and Treasurer were authorized to hypothecate the issue of debentures for \$25,000. with the Canadian Bank of Commerce until such time as the council deems it wise to dispose of the same.

J. A. Thompson, of Thornhill, was reappointed as assessor for the west half of the township at a salary of \$325 and H. R. Forster was appointed for the west side at a salary of \$250.

N. L. Mortson, chartered accountant of Thornhill, was appointed as auditor for the municipality at a salary \$200.00

The following accounts were ordered paid: Municipal World \$15.85; Liberal Printing Co. \$70.94; J. L. McDonald & Son, Thornhill, re charity account \$6.97; Economist & Sun \$222.35; Clifford Whittaker, re charity account \$23.65; Jas. Walker, constable salary and mileage for December \$34.05.

J. Hitchcock. The audited report of the retiring trustees, L. G. Stoutenburgh and S. Boynton showed a favorable balance of \$56. Twenty-one residents of the community were in attendance.
