**Decide Radial  
Question Friday**

MAYOR WEMP SAYS — SHARE  
THE DEFICIT, BUY THE LINE  
OR RIDE ON THE BUSES

THE PEOPLE SAY: — GIVE US AN  
ADEQUATE RADIAL SERVICE.  
FINANCE YOUR OWN TRAN-  
SPORTATION SYSTEMS, OR  
GIVE UP TRANSPORT-  
ATION RIGHTS IN YORK  
COUNTY

Friday at ten a. m. is the zero hour  
for the radials. That is the date and  
time set by the Toronto Board of Control  
when the conference commenced  
last Friday with T. T. C. officials and  
the County Committee will be resumed  
and according to affirmed declarations  
of Mayor Wemp a definite decision  
arrived at. On Wednesday in setting  
the time for the conference Mayor  
Wemp said that by that time the  
County must choose either to help pay  
the deficit, buy the line or ride on the  
buses.

It is impossible to say at the time  
of going to press what the answer of  
the County will be but north Yonge  
Street residents are hoping that their  
representatives will be no less firm and  
decisive in their answer, than was the  
Mayor in his ultimatum. North  
Yonge Street district which is unani-  
mous in opposing the proposal to sub-  
stitute a Bus Service for a Radial Ser-  
vices on the result of which so much  
depends.

The people have faith in the radials  
and believe that they have rights in  
the matter of a transportation system.  
They are not looking for their repre-  
sentatives to sacrifice any of those  
interests to the City of Toronto. At  
the Friday morning session York  
County should be no less firm than the  
City of Toronto in stating that the  
City must decide whether or not they  
are going to give the district an ade-  
quate radial service, look after their  
own financing or else sacrifice any  
rights to transportation on North  
Yonge Street.

It appears that the City has no wish  
to give up the transportation rights  
throughout the County. Their aim  
appears merely to substitute a Bus  
Service on which they can charge the  
people practically what they like, for a  
radial service where the people are  
protected by the tariff of rates fixed  
by the Railway Board. York County  
Council must not sacrifice the rights  
of the County or leave the people at  
the mercy of bus line in the hands of  
the Toronto Transportation Commission.

Feeling throughout the district is at  
a high pitch to-day in anticipation of  
the result of the conference, and sev-  
eral prominent citizens interviewed ex-  
pressed themselves very strongly on  
the question. It is expected several  
from this district will attend the con-  
ference to-morrow.

Several interviewed are still of the  
opinion that Hon. G. S. Henry will in-  
tervene in the negotiations and cancel  
the permit for the operation of buses  
on Yonge Street issued by his depart-  
ment a year ago. It is pointed out  
that the buses are not only being  
forced on the people against their ex-  
pressed wishes but that they are a  
menace to public safety in the crowd-  
ed and already congested traffic on  
Yonge Street.

been specially arranged to give the  
citizens of the village an opportunity

speak on "The Peace Garden." This  
is a project which is being promoted  
to commemorate the hundred years of  
peace which have been experienced be-  
tween Canada and the United States.  
This should be a subject of interest to  
all citizens and the Society hopes for  
a large attendance. There will be a  
silver collection at the door to defray  
expenses.

**Markham Council Raises Salary  
of the Road Superintendent**

An uneventful meeting of the Mark-  
ham township council was held at the  
township hall, Unionville on Monday  
afternoon. Reeve Gohn presided and  
all the members were present.

With Deputy-Reeve R. L. Stiver op-  
posed council increased the salary of  
road superintendent, W. G. Maxwell  
to \$125. per month. His previous  
salary was \$100. per month. Deputy  
Reeve Stiver said that the council had  
called for applications for the position  
only last year when a number of appli-  
cations were received. He thought it  
was too early to start boosting the  
salary. He would favor Mr. Maxwell  
carrying on at the same rate for this  
year and if the council thought he  
gave good satisfaction they could give  
him a bonus at the end of the year.  
Mr. Stiver said he had no particular  
fault to find with the superintendent,  
but that there had been a lot of criti-  
cism of the superintendent attending  
plowing matches last fall.

Mr. Maxwell said that when he at-  
tended plowing matches he worked  
late at night to make up for it, and he  
also had other help at home with the  
books.

The rest of the members favored an  
increase and it was accordingly grant-  
ed. It was pointed out that in the  
carrying out of his duties the superin-  
tendent drives a great many miles and  
that the upkeep of his car was a big  
item.

"I can't do it on \$100. a month, gentle-  
men," said Mr. Maxwell, "I'd be bet-  
ter working on the roads with a pick  
and shovel."

The province pays one half of the  
salary of the road superintendent.

Mr. and Mrs. W. Leusy wrote the  
council expressing thanks for the \$100  
reward for capturing a chicken thief.

The collectors were given until Mar-  
ch 1st to collect outstanding taxes.

There was a short discussion of the  
Metropolitan Radial problem and the  
members are unanimous in a determi-

nation to do all possible to continue the  
operation of the line.
