The heavy explosions of Roman candles, bombs and rockets began the attack, which culminated when the besiegers were driven back by the garrison, who sent volley after volley of blanks crashing into the night. When the bugles sounded the "Cease Fire", the show was generally voted one of the finest in years.

The outstanding contributions that the Canadian Pacific Railway has made to the life of the Dominion in an industrial and cultural way were emphasized by E. W. Beatty, chairman and president of the road, at a recent address before the Canadlan Industrial Traffic League at Montreal recently. His company, he said, had in the past five years, spent over \$249,000,000 on capital account alone and during the same period had built over 1,000 miles of branch lines. 1929 with its decrease in earnings, he regarded as an exceptional year not likely to be repeated in subsequent years.

Each of these was repeated by request on three successive days.

The 16th annual winter carnival with the first official Western Canada Ski tournament will be held at Revelstoke, February 4-5. World records have been made on the ski hill at Revelstoke, and leading ski jumpers of the continent will atand the carnival.
