Fresh specials at 26 to 30 ounces to the dozen commanded 40 to 45 cents a dozen. One of the best displays was of a dozen eggs that tipped the scales at 35 oz., for which 60 cents was asked. Duck eggs brought 6 cents each.

Fresh greenhouse produce was much in demand by the patrons, although the prices remained the same as last week. Rhubarb, radishes, watercress leaf lettuce, parsley and mint were all displayed on several stands.

Ontario Spy apples continue to bring the highest apple prices on the market at 40 to 60 cents for a six-quart basket. They are still firm and of good quality, kept in cellars for storage.

Roses and tulips were the main varieties of flowers. They sold at low prices, 75 cents to \$1.50 a dozen.
