

Electors of Richmond Hill, Markham, Vaughan and North York went to the polls on Saturday last and gave an overwhelming majority for the transportation by-law which authoro izes the purchase of the radial line as I far as Richmond Hill. The total vote o in the four municipalites was 1335 for the by-law and 110 against. There were only six votes against the proposal in Richmond Hill, eight, in Markham, ten in Vaughan, and eighty ix in North York. It was a decisive answer in favor of a car service on Yonge Street and against a bus serv-


