## GENERAL NEWS AND VIEWS

Present indications throughout York County are for a bumper crop this year. Farmers in all sections are enthusiastic about the way the grain crop has come along.

This being Shriners Convention Week it would appear that in and about Toronto everything on wheels is on the highway. The wise driver is the one who thinks in terms of SAFETY FIRST.

North York Township is considering the installation of stop lights on Yonge Street at the Lansing corner. Stop lights for Yonge Street in Richmond Hill at Arnold Street corner have often been suggested in council.

The open season for Garden Parties is here.

North York township council struck the tax rate for the year at the meeting last week. The rate this year is one mill higher than last year. For township purposes a rate of 12 mills is necessary.

In the words of an enthusiastic supporter of an adequate car service on Yonge Street "It won't be long now."

Only one-third of the objective of \$2,000 required as a guarantee to install "talkies" in Meaford, has been raised by the Board of Trade in an advance ticket sale.

Down in Southwestern Ontario the little town of Blenheim has discovered a graveyard under its main street. The bones of two persons, presumably of a man and a woman, either Indian or early settlers, were unearthed during excavations for sewer connections. Only a few years ago workmen digging a hotel cellar made a similar discovery.

### King Township Council

The above council met at Temperance Hall, Kettleby on Saturday, May 31st, 1930. Members were all present. The minutes and communications of last meeting were read and confirmed.

The following bills were presented and ordered paid:—General accounts; John Boadwin, digging grave re John Northgrave \$7.00; Cecil Walker, services re school attendance \$12.30; Addison Black, street lighting P.V.S. \$15.50. Road accounts;—Total of voucher No. 9, \$155.59; No. 10, \$542.30 No. 11 \$216.41; No. 12 \$286.20.

MacMurchy-Jefferson — That this council do hereby recommend to the council of the County of York, that they take over that portion of the road on the Townline between King and Tecumseth from Schomberg westerly. The same to complete an agreement with the Counties of Dufferin and Simcoe to complete their road connecting with the York Simcoe Road. And that a copy of this resolution be sent to Mr. R. W. Phillips, clerk of the County of York to be brought before the York County Council at the June Session.

Jefferson-Walkington — That the Clerk be instructed to write Miss G. Amey re Library at Schomberg, that after they have made the necessary Government Origination, their request for a grant will be considered by this Council.

MacMurchy-Jefferson — That the Clerk is hereby instructed to write to the Dominion Railway Board, and ask them to furnish figures as to the probable cost if any of a Wig-wag erected at the crossing in the village of King City.

Jefferson-MacMurchy — That the Treasurer be authorized to pay sheep claims to the amount of \$341.00.

Walkington-MacMurchy — That the Treasurer be instructed to write J. A. MacLean, Tottenham, and enclose cheque for \$50.00 in payment of John Howard, indigent account as per agreement.

Jefferson-MacMurchy — That the Treasurer be authorized to pay the sum of \$50.00 to each of the Assessors on account.

Legge-Jefferson — That Mr. Black, Walkington and MacMurchy be a committee to negotiate the purchase of a grader from Vaughan Township at \$400.00.

Jefferson-MacMurchy — That the Department of Agricultural be given a grant of \$15.00 for prizes in aid of Junior Farmers organization.

Walkington-Jefferson — That the

Bracebridge town council has struck the tax rate at 54 mills.
