Safety Responsibility Law of Ontario

Under this law the operator's license and his motor vehicle permit will be suspended until the holder has given proof of his financial responsibility if any of the following offences have been committed in Ontario or any other Province of the Dominion of Canada or in any of the States of the United States; or if he has not paid any final judgment against him for damages caused to any person to the limit of \$5000.00 for any one person and \$10.000.00 if two or more persons have been injured or to the property of another in excess of \$100.00 and up to \$10-00.00 arising out of a motor vehicle accident whether such judgment be rendered against him in Ontario or in any other Province of Canada.

FOLLOWING ARE THE OFFENCES MENTIONED IN THE ACT

Reckless driving if any injury to any person or property. Racing on the Highway or exceeding the speed limit if any injury

to any person occurs in connection therewith.

Failing to remain at or return to the scene of an accident.

Driving without a license. Any criminal offence involving use of a motor vehicle which in-

cludes any conviction for driving a motor car while intoxicated. If damage be done to person or property of others the operator's license or motor vehicle permit which has been suspended WILL NOT BE RESTORED UNTIL DAMAGES AWARDED BY THE COURT IN ANY PROVINCE HAVE BEEN PAID.
