Broad beans and broccoli were the newest vegetables on North Toronto market Tuesday evening; peas were selling at 35 and 40 cents a basket, green and yellow beans were on hand as well as a big supply of all seasonable vegetables.

Fresh fruit and fruit pies were selling well and a good supply of home cooking was on the stands.

Bunches of cut flowers of all the popular garden varieties sold from 10 cents a bunch up to 50 cents for roses which commanded the top price.

EMPIRE TRADE is Canada's Road to Prosperity

World-wide conditions have created an economic situation that presents problems demanding the highest qualities of statesmanship for their solution. Since the war period, new tariff barriers have been created by many countries, restricting the outlets for Canadian products and necessitating new trade arrangements.

LOWER COST OF LIVING
