

One hundred and twenty-six applications for the position of assistant raretaker for the village were read at the regular meeting of the council held on Wednesday night. Applications were received from Richmond Hill, | Haileybury, Midland, Erindale, Wye, Coppercliff, Hamilton, Goodwood, Peterboro, Newmarket, Niagara Falls, St. Thomas, Lindsay, Birchcliffe, Guelph, Deseronto, Milton, Ezard, Willawdale, Maple, Woodstock, Timmins, Gravenhurst and several scores from Toronto. Applications ranged all the way from !! igh class stationery engineers and chysical instructors to ordinary laborers and salaries asked were all the Richmond Hill, who will commence his rew duties right away. 126 Applications INCREASED RATE FOR COUNTY PURPOSES - BAD CORNER ON MAPLE SIDEROAD WILL BE STRAIGHTENED

> Vaughan township council met at Vellore on Tuesday afternoon. Reeve James Robson occupied the chair and all the members were present. The by-law was passed fixing the various tax rates for the year. The township rate was fixed at 8.2 mills the same as isst year but the County rate which in recent years has continually risen is still on the upgrade and this year a rate of 13.7 is necessary in Vaughan to meet the County requirements. The amount required for! County purposes is \$56,086.61 which includes the cost of secondary education. Last year the County rate on the Township was 12.2 mills. The general school rate will be the same as previously and the rates for the various school sections are in keeping with the requisition of the respective school boards.

Road work throughout the township s progressing favorably and a large amount of excellent work has been accomplished this year. On Tuesday efternoon the members of the council visited the scene of operations and viewed the new township machinery in action. 
STRANGERS SHOW GRAT-ITUDE IN STRANGE MANNER
