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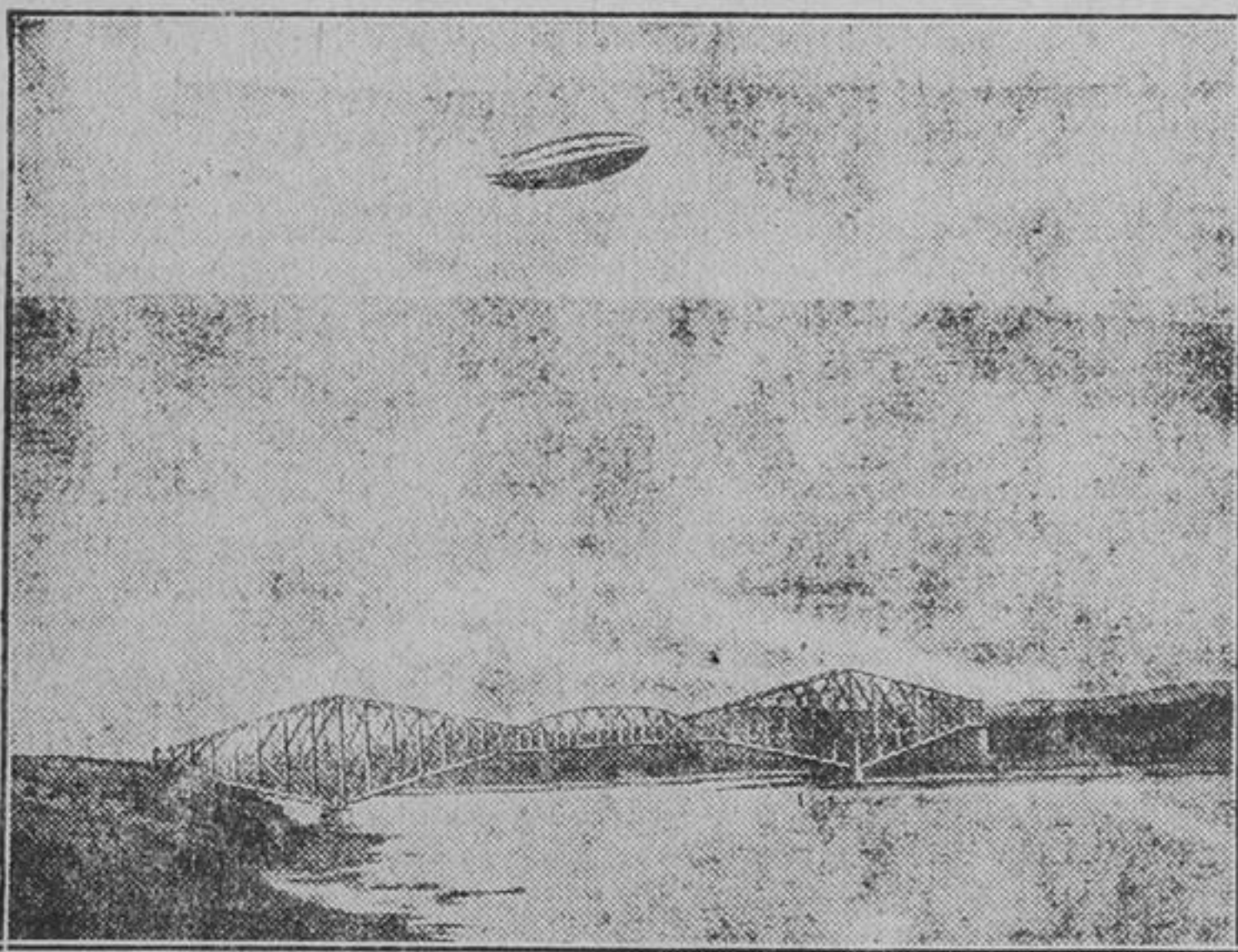
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## TITAN SALUTES TITAN

### York Market

Golden bantam and white corn were on the market at North Toronto Tuesday night. Both varieties sold at 35 cents a dozen. Some nice pickling cucumbers were 75 cents a basket. Green peppers sold at 2 for 5 cents.

Pears and plums were on the fruit stands, as well as berries and several varieties of apples.

The flower stands were brilliant with blooms; some fine spikes of gladioli sold at 40 cents a dozen.

Prices were quoted as follows:  
Chicken, roasting, 40c lb; boiling, 35c; broiling, 40c. Ducks, 40c. Eggs ducks, 60c dozen; specials, 45c; extras 40c; firsts, 38c; pullets 35c. Butter, 35c and 38c lb. Cream, 40c pt. Cooked ham, 50c lb.

Lord Luke of Pavenham, chairman of Bovril Ltd., arrived in Canada recently on the Empress of Australia en route to Australia. His Lordship is operating a settlement scheme in the Argentine whereby farmers rent lands from a company, paying 15 per cent. on the company's marketing of their crops. He is contemplating a similar company in Australia in connection with sheep raising. He will also examine possibilities in the Prairies for a similar settlement organization.

Heavy entries are reported for all classes of athletics, piping and dancing events to be decided at the Highland Gathering and Scottish Music Festival to be held at Banff, August 30-September 2, as also for the Dominion track and Field Championships to be held there Labor Day. ### RULES AND REGULATIONS

- 1. The membership fee is \$1.00 annually, and is due in January of each year. The fee must be paid before July 1 in order to entitle a member to a premium.
- 2. Only members of the Society whose fee has been paid before the date of the fair, shall be entitled to exhibit or compete at any show of the Society, except where otherwise provided.
- 3. The Hall will be open for the reception of exhibits at 9 a. m. on the day of the September Exhibition and all exhibits must be placed in position not later than 11 a. m. of that day to allow judges to make the awards and no exhibit may be removed before 9 p. m.
- 4. No competitor shall be allowed to make more than one entry in each section.
- 5. Not more than one entry from the same garden will be accepted in any one section.
- 6. No exhibit will be entitled to a prize unless it possesses points of merit, and at the discretion of the judges no awards will be made to unworthy exhibits, even though there be only one entry in the section.
- 7. All exhibits must be the property of and grown on the premises of the exhibitor.
- 8. Exhibitors must make their entries with the secretary not later than Friday, September 5th.
- 9. No exhibitor shall be entitled to money for more than six prizes. This does not refer in any instance to the Special Prize List.
- 10. Where a specific number is asked for in an exhibit never show even one more. One fewer than the number may win a prize but one more never can.
