The National Dairy Council of Canada in a recent report stated that Saskatchewan stood third in the Dominion in the matter of estimated gross revenue from dairy products in 1929. The figures are given at \$21,000,000 as compared with \$20,979,000 the previous year.

Total production of maple syrup in Canada for 1930 was 2,185,379 gallons valued at \$3,869,107, and of maple sugar 8,208,276 pounds. valued at \$1,381,513. Average market price of maple syrup was \$1.77 a gallon, and of maple sugar 17 cents a pound. The Province of Quebec was the largest producer and balance came from Ontario, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

Market prospects for truit growers of Nova Scotia are encouraging because the British Isles must look to Nova Scotia for the bulk of their barrelled apple supply until November 15, as a result of the embargo on barrelled fruit from the United States.

Last year a British artist publicly declared Canadian women to be the most beautiful in the Empire and now another Britisher - this time a newspaper man - claims they are the Empire's greatest travellers. It appears that a check-up on railway travel in summer reveals that eighty per cent, are Richmond Hill females.



#### CANADIAN NATIONAL HIGH SPOTS AT C.N.E.



MAGINE a glorious section of the Canadian Rockies hewn boldly from the bosom of Mother Earth, and a giant hand reaching down into one of the Canadian National Steamships' West Indies' fleet and stealing a group of luxurious cabins, then you have an idea of this year's exhibit of the Canadian National Railways at the Canadian National Exhibition.

Jasper National Park is one of the two features of the exhibit. In a 50-foot long panorama of the mountains, a mother bear and her cubs go frollicking in the forest, deer are made to scamper through the brush and the noble Athabasca river sings a rippling song of contentment.

Marvellous effects are obtained by the use of colored lights. Beginning with the faint light of dawn, the sky changes to the beautiful hues of sunrise and slowly dusk comes and moving clouds are painted with reds and blues to give an excellent idea of the sunsets for which the mountains are noted.

In another part of the railways' building, visitors walk the gang plank and over the side into the "Lady Nelson", flagship of the West Indies fleet. Inside the white hull, is a portion of the main lobby and, directly opposite, the purser's office. A uniformed officer is ready behind the grille and he has an efficient staff of six stewards waiting to initiate the visitor into the ship's mysteries. Leading off the lobby are rooms, exact replicas of those on board the "Lady" ships, and showing the various types of accommodation.
